THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Sept. 2.—The receipts of butter yesterday were 51 packages, as against 2,397 for the same day last week, and 1,607 for the corresponding day a year ago. At Gould's Cold Storage yesterday there were 700 packages of creamery butter offered, of which the lots of finest quality sold at 37 3/8c per lb., delivered. On the whole the market was without any special feature to note, the feeling being about steady with no improvement in the demand from English importers, and little new business of importance passing for local account. On spot round lots of finest creamery were nominally quoted at 38 1/2c to 39c per lb.

We quote wholesale prices for round lots as follows:

Pasteurized creamery 39 1/2c to 40c
Fine creamery 38 1/2c to 39c
Fine creamery 37 1/2c to 38c

The receipts of cheese yesterday were 19,924 boxes, as compared with 17,594 for the corresponding day a year ago. At Gould's Cold Storage 7,000 boxes of cheese were offered which met with a better demand, and all sold at 18 1/2c per lb., delivered here. At the auction sale of Ontario cheese buyers also showed a better disposition to operate, and as the prices bid, were satisfied with the lot. According to reports from over the cable, and business in this direction was dull.

There were no new developments in the local market for eggs yesterday, prices for all grades being fully maintained with a fairly active trade passing for local account. The demand is chiefly for the higher grades and sales of strictly new laid stock were made at 50c per dozen. The receipts yesterday were 4,789 cases, as against 4,523 for the same day last week, and 1,889 for the corresponding day a year ago.

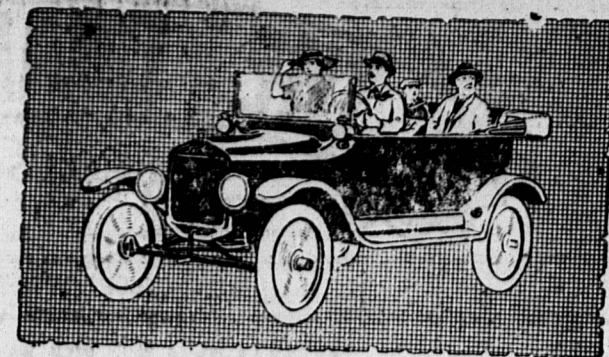
Wholesale jobbing prices were quoted as follows:

The demand for maple product shows no improvement and the market rules very quiet with no change in prices to note, maple syrup being quoted at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per tin, of one gallon, and maple sugar at 15c to 17c per lb., as to quality.

The market for car lots of potatoes continues quiet, of which the offerings are not large on account of the warm weather prevailing, and demand for such at the present is not such as to fill the markets where the supplies of waggon loads is ample to meet all wants at present and sales were made at \$1.75 to \$2 per bag of 80 lbs.

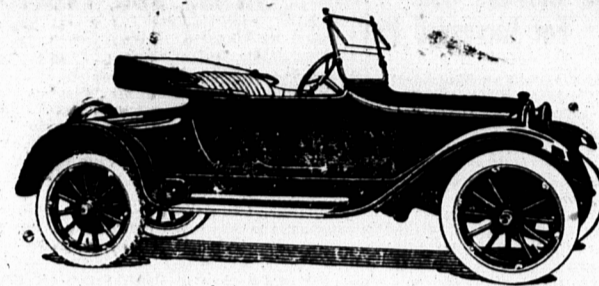

WIRELESS SYSTEM FROM THE NORTH

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 2.—Edmonton and all the outside world is soon to have direct wireless communication with Fort Norman and Fort Smith as well as other northern points, according to the plans of a local firm who have just been granted a federal license for the operation of a commercial wireless between these points. Marconi equipment will be used and wireless operators will be brought from the coast. It is expected to have the system in full operation by the early spring. With the installation of wireless upon the northern steamers a continuous system of wireless will be available through the north.

He added that the Reichs Bank had been obliged to take 65,000,000 marks in gold dollars and other foreign money from its gold reserves, which are now on the way to New York.

BRITISH CATTLE MARKET

Prices Firmer with Weather Conditions Nearer Normal

With prospects of cooler weather, the outlook for fresh meat prices in Great Britain is improved.

At Glasgow on Monday, 75 Canadian cattle were offered, and sold from 12 1/2d, up to 14 1/4d, or 12 1/4c, to 24c, offal, sunk equivalent to 7 1/4d, to 8d, or 7 1/4c, to 13 1/2c, per pound live weight, 55 mixed Western cattle averaged 7d, or 12c, alive. Current exchange, Birkenhead offered 800 Canadians, sales ranging from 12 1/2d, to 14d, or 21 1/4c, to 23 3/4c, in sink, Current Exchange.

London prices are 12 1/2d, to 15d, or 21 1/4c, to 22c, per pound for dressed sides, Lambs 24 1/2c, per pound dressed.
