FAITH HEALER A SENSATION IN VANCOUVER

Rev. Gordon Dickie, formerly minister in Knox church, writing from Vancouver to a St. John friend says:

"Vancouver has been greatly stirred during the last three weeks by the visit of an American evangelist, Dr. C. S. Price. He was formerly a Congregational minister in Los Angeles, but he got 'converted' and is now out on a healing mission. Victoria was first taken by storm and now Vancouver is at his feet. He holds his services in the Arena, the biggest rink in Canada and every night it is filled to overflowing. When there is healing all the doors are closed by the fire officials at 6 o'clock and no more are allowed in than the 10,000 which the building will hold. I tell you it is an imposing sight to look down from the platform on that sea of faces so small in the distance that you can scarcely tell that they are faces. The man has wrought many great cures. A woman in my congregation had been cured of her blindness. He makes the deaf to hear, the lame to walk, cancers are taken away by prayer and words of healing and altogether the mission is a most awe inspiring one. I never saw anything like it and all the other ministers are equally mystified by the whole procedure. He has emptied the play houses and filled the churches, for the time being at any rate and stirred the whole city to the very foundations. Best of all he is a very likeable fellow and just as sincere as he can be. Presbyterians were never so strong on revival service as a rule, but they are all in his up to the elbows."

NOTES ON THE FIFTH P. E. ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 33RD WEEK ENDING JUNE 19TH, 1923.

There was a decrease in the total number of eggs laid 847 eggs were laid as against 882 of the previous week. A number of birds are broody.

Mrs. Edward Bullitt's pen of White Leghorns tied with Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns for the week with 54 eggs. Mrs. D. F. McDonald's pen of Wyandottes tied with the Experimental Stations pen of White Leghorns No. 15 for second place with 51 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns tied with H. L. Machon's Barred Rocks and the Experimental Stations pen of White Leghorns No. 18 for third with 50 eggs. Mr. Bert R. Brown's pen of Barred Rocks was fourth with 48 eggs. Mr. Elliphel Howatt's pen of Single Comb Rhode Island Reds was fifth with 47 eggs. Mrs. James E. Daly's pen of Barred Rocks was sixth with 44 eggs.

Mrs. Edward Bullitt's pen of White Leghorns lead the Contest with 427 eggs. The Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 18 second with 121 eggs. Mr. D. F. McDonald's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 fourth with 137 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's pen of White Leghorns fifth with 1124 eggs. Mr. Augustine Wisner's pen of White Wyandottes sixth with 1118 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns seventh with 1111 eggs. and Pendleton Bros. pen of Barred Rocks eight with 1092 eggs.

Mr. D. F. McDonald's pen No 7 leads the contest to date with 162 eggs. The Experimental Stations hen No. 1 pen 18 second with 155 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's hen No. 6 pen No. 20 third with 154 eggs. and Mr. H. L. Machon's hen No. 5 pen No. 9 fourth with 152 eggs.

Pen No. 5 laid 222 for the 8th 4 weekly period, pen No. 18 221 eggs and pen 20 laid 210 eggs.

A number of fishermen refused to haul Tuesday and Wednesday. On the North Shore from Cable Head East, is about the same. Fishermen, however, are not taking in their traps. Hopeful ones allege there will be good fishing along the North Shore by July 1st. There is an extension of two weeks but fishing does not improve, few will take advantage of it and it is losing money for the packer to run his factory at 100 lbs per boat and the fishermen needs to fish at least a minimum of 200 lbs per day (two men) to make decent wages. Hauling 400 traps each day is no boy's job particularly on a lee-shore like the North Side.

series of demonstrations by a cavalry regiment and a section of the Royal Horse Artillery at war strength.


