valour and sacrifice; to provide suitable burial; and to observe an annual memorial day. To educate public opinion regarding national duties to the dead, the disabled, and others who have served, and their dependants. To foster loyalty among the public and education in the principles of patriotism, duty and unselfish service to pass on to our families and descendants the traditions for which we stand.

We have in Charlottetown an active Branch of the Legion, and it is our wish that a similar branch will be formed in the several centres throughout the Island. Our fees are small being but \$4.00 per annum with \$1.00 extra as entrance fee. We have however decided that until these other branches are organized we will receive into our branch any man who has served his Country, and living outside of Charlottetown as an associate member at the small fee of \$2.00 per annum. By this means we hope to awaken interest in the Legion outside our City bounds, and believe that when interest is awakened it will not be long until local branches will appear in all our towns and villages. While in the city make our Legion Home, 57 Grafton Street, your assembly point, as you will be sure to meet some of your old friends.

Comrades let us stand together as we stood in 1914-18. Our country needs our best at the present time. Previous to the late Imperial Conference, Russian and other papers prophesied the fall of our Empire, but the world has since learned that the same cement which bound us together in the years of strain and stress, still binds together today the British Empire. The cement, the key stone of our Empire is best expressed in the valedictory message of the Empire Premiers to His Majesty our King. At the close of recent Imperial Conference, it reads as follows: "We have found in all our deliberations a spirit of mutual goodwill and an earnest desire for co-operation in promoting the prosperity of the several parts of the Empire. The foundation of our work has been the sure knowledge that to each of us, as to all your Majesty's subjects, the Crown is the abiding symbol and emblem of the unity of the British Commonwealth of Nations."

"We pray that, under Divine providence, your Majesty may long be spared, with her Majesty the Queen, to watch over the destinies of all the nations and peoples of our Empire." If we today have received through the Imperial Conference increased privileges, a new status as may claim the politicians immediately, let us as men who have served and still revere our Empire and its Institutions, repeatedly point out that it is our duty to share with the Motherland, Empire obligations. Let us forget partialities when necessary and bring out that we are talking about in taking our share in the Naval and Military defence of the Empire. That

as a body to show our brotherhood, and love for King and Motherland, Sister Dominions and our own dear Canada. Comrades singing the National Anthem will not in itself save our Empire. Therefore let us see that our defence forces are in such a condition that they will be prepared and ready to do their duty. When this is accomplished we can then sing with all the meaning we can put into it. Our loved Dominion bless, With peace and happiness From shore to shore. And may our Empire be United, Loyal, Free True to herself and True For evermore. Comrades of the Great War join the Canadian Legion. GOD SAVE THE KING
