**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

**Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.**

Help the Hospitals by your presence at the Hockey match tonight.

The winter steamers made good crossings yesterday and the mails reached the city at 2.15.

The managers of Hillsboro Rink and the senior hockey players of the city have decided to put on a hockey match tonight in aid of the hospitals. The worthy object ought to fill the Rink, and doubtless the friends of both the P. E. Island and the City Hospitals will be present in large numbers.

It is with deep sympathy and regret that the many friends in Dundas and vicinity have learned of the sad death of Herbert H. Hiltz at his former home in Lunenburg Co., N. S., after an illness of several months which he contracted from a fall he received while at work on a building at Roxbury, Mass. some four years ago, and never fully recovered. Mr. Hiltz was 39 years of age and a man of good Christian qualities, a member of the Official Board of the Eggleston Sq. M. E. Church in Roxbury, and an ardent worker in its cause. During his stay of seven years in Upton he proved to be an earnest worker; always taking a prominent part in Churches, Lodges and Schools, being elected many times a delegate from them to various places. His loss was keenly felt when he departed to make his home in Roxbury, but he expressed hopes of some day returning to be with us once more. Thinking to remain healthy he went to his old home in N. S. four months ago only to gradually sink away and expire on the 29th inst. in the presence of his wife, youngest son and many friends. His wife, who patiently nursed him in his illness, has returned to Roxbury to reside with her three children. Our hearts go out in kind sympathy to her and all the bereaved. — A sad and peculiar incident occurred at the same place. Sydney, a brother, was taken ill with pneumonia on the 26th inst. and died eight hours before Herbert. Both were interred at the same hour side by side.

A WRITER to the Presbyterian Witness en route to Ottawa and speaking of the passengers on the train says of those from this Province: "Prince Edward Island away down amidst the ice and mists is rather a 'far cry' from here. But amongst those on board, are some, bound for the opening of Parliament at Ottawa. Of these one is Senator Robertson, of Montague, P. E. Island, who yesterday came from Georgetown to Picloa in the long boat, and is enthusiastic about the success of the 'Winter Service' this season. The 'Minto' under Capt. Finlayson and the 'Stanley' under Capt. Brown, have done excellent service all this hard cold season of wind, and snow and ice. These captains now understand the winds, tides, ice and currents pretty thoroughly, and excepting in rare times of thick fog, and very heavy ice-jams, can make a success of winter navigation between the 'The Island,' and the mainland. This 'winter service' is a great boon to the Islanders, and the trade is growing rapidly in extent and importance. From the 9th of December last till the end of February these boats have earned \$8,500 each for freight alone. Frozen smelts, and other fish, large quantities of pork, poultry, and dairy produce are finding their way regularly to the outside world. Thus opening up a profitable market at a time when prices are highest and when formerly there were only the limited home needs to be supplied. It can be seen, at a glance how much this means for the people of Prince Edward Island. The captains say that, with the experience now gained, all that is needed is more steam power, and greater weight in their boats, to make the service a complete success. The winter navigation of the Northumberland Straits has long been a difficult problem, and has cost a good deal to make the experiments, and gain the necessary knowledge of the varied conditions to be met. Everything possible should now be done to utilize to the best advantage all the experience gained, and give the Island a thoroughly good service in winter, as well as in summer.
