A VERY enjoyable at home was held Monday night by the Y's in Willard Hall. A short program consisting of a duet by Misses Bessie Morris and Ida Gough, an address by Rev. F. W. A VERY sad drowning accident occurred Monday evening off fifteen Point. Messrs. Wilbert Arsenault, son of Mr. Frank Arsenault of Summerside and Mr. Wesley Allen, son of Mr. B. C. Allen of Fifteen Point while returning from their traps with a load of lobsters encountered a squall about three miles from the shore in which their boats became capsized and sank until only about four feet of the mast remained above water. Both got hold of

the mast and clung to it for nearly two hours, when Arsenault became exhausted and let go. Allan caught him and again both held on for a while but Arsenault dropped off a second time. His companion again quickly rescued him and pinioning him to the mast with his arm held him until he died. Still hoping to be rescued he held the lifeless body in his arms for half an hour longer when he himself became totally exhausted and the body floated out of his grasp. How he held on after this he is scarcely conscious of. After being in the water four hours he was picked up by his brother, Mr. Webster Allan who happened to be returning from his traps and saw the capsized boat. When, rescued although conscious, he could neither see nor speak. His hands were bleeding, swollen and benumbed with the cold, his face bruised and cut. He was taken to the factory cook-house where he was cared for. He is now doing well and will soon be around again. His plucky though unavailing effort to save his companion under almost hopeless difficulty and with death staring him in the face shows Mr. Allan, who is only 18 years of age, to be a hero, and his almost miraculous escape is

a cause of thankfulness to a very large circle of friends. Wilbert Arsenault was 24 years of age and had been married only a few months. He had been during the past three years in the employ of Messrs. Bruce McKay & Co. by whom and by all who knew him he was most highly esteemed. At latest account his body has yet not been discovered.
