(Canadian Press) PALERMO, Sicily, Nov. 3. - Father and son, aged respectively 30 and 50, who had never seen each other, have met for the first time. The meeting was coincident with their release from prison.

Fifty years ago a peasant from the interior of Sicily was sentenced to life imprisonment for murder. He was told that on the same day his wife had given birth to a son.

When the convict's son was 20, he learned that his father had been convicted on the false testimony of two witnesses. These the son promptly waylaid and shot. For this crime the son was sentenced to 30 years penal servitude. On the day of the son's release the father received a pardon and for the first time father and son met and embraced.

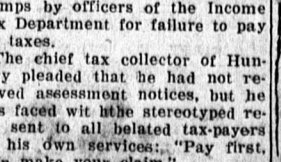
The Minister paid the full amount and then started an investigation in his ministry to ascertain who was responsible for the failure to send him his tax bills.
