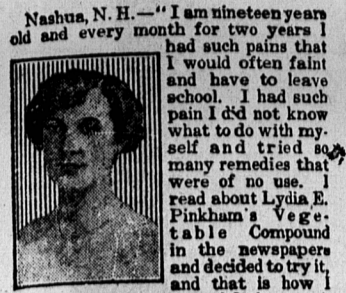

### MT. ALBION HERO WELCOMED HOME

The Mt. Albion Red Cross Society has had many pleasant social gatherings since its organization but perhaps the most enjoyable of all took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter R. Brown, a few nights ago. This time nearly the whole district turned out not to knit socks or pack boxes to send across the Atlantic, but to welcome home Mr. Brown's son Lance-Corp. Frank Brown, who had served King and country "somewhere in France," for over four years.

Corp. Brown, enlisted in the beginning of 1916 and fought through some of the hardest engagements of the war. He comes home bringing several "scars of battle" with him, as he was wounded on three different occasions, one time very severely but he looks today apparently little the worse after his very trying experiences, and is wearing a silver medal presented to him by the British government for bravery on the battle field. After the crowd had assembled Mr. Robt. Jenkins took the chair and the following programme was carried out.

Remarks by the chairman and Messrs. Benj. Jenkins and Mr. J. MacEachern. Duet by Misses Victoria Jenkins and Marguerete MacEachern. Recitation by Clifford Myers. Solo by Miss Edna Jenkins, also several very much appreciated vocal selections by Mr. Harry Brown.

After the rendition of the programme the following address was read by Mr. M. J. MacEachern, and a purse of gold was presented to the returned hero by Miss Edna Jenkins. To Lance-Corp. Frank Brown.

It is with feelings of great pride and thankfulness that we, your friends and neighbors assemble here to-night to welcome you back home after serving over four years on the battlefields of France and Flanders.

With pride, we say because you freely offered yourself as a sacrifice in our behalf, that we might be able to remain in our peaceful homes undisturbed and not trodden down by the autocratic Hun.

With thankfulness because you have been spared to return to your friends and home where you left enjoying the best of health, strength and social happiness, fully cognizant of the great sacrifice you were making.

We feel like congratulating your parents in having sons with such heroism and patriotism and hope that your brother Sydney who is at present also in France may also be spared to return home safely and in good health.

And now Frank as you have returned bearing the scars of battle, being wounded on three different occasions, which necessitated your spending many weeks in the hospital, we wish you renewed health and strength to be able to resume your civilian work knowing that if you conduct yourself in the same many way as when a soldier your success shall be assured and now we ask you to accept this gift, which we do not intend to be commensurate with the sacrifice you have made but simply as a small recognition from your friends, again we bid you welcome.

### New Rail Route To Western Canada

Travellers between Eastern and Western Canada are showing their appreciation of the high standard of railway service afforded by "The National," the splendid train which operates between Toronto and Winnipeg. Line, while the rich Cobalt and Porcupine districts may be inspected. These are followed by a wonderfully interesting trip through the sparsely populated territory of New Ontario, giving the traveller an opportunity of inspecting this fertile region, including the famed "clay belt" where tens of thousands of settlers will make their homes in the future. The area of New Ontario is 330,000 square miles fully four times the size of Old Ontario, and in addition to great expenses of good farming land, it has wonderful resources in timber, minerals, water power, fish and game.

These three railroads have combined to make the through passenger service over this new route the equal of that offered anywhere on the continent. The smooth, straight and level roadbed embodies all that has been learned in three quarters of a century of railway building. The greatest travel comfort assured. The use of the new route involves no extra fare, as compared with any other route available between points in Eastern and Western Canada.

#### Mr. WALLACE W. JENKINS.

The people of Georgetown and of all the surrounding country were greatly shocked when it was learned that Mr. Wallace W. Jenkins of Georgetown had passed away on Saturday night Mar. 16

The deceased who was 58 years of age appeared to be in his usual state of health till a few days ago it was learned that he was taken ill but no one appeared to think of it as being serious so that his death comes as a great shock to his friends. The late Mr. Jenkins was a man of sterling qualities and was very popular with all his fellow townsmen and with all who had any business dealing with him.

He was of a kind and courteous disposition, charitable and considerate to those less fortunate than himself and ever ready to support any measure that would add to the welfare of the community. It is needless to say that he will be greatly missed not only as a neighbor and citizen but as a man of business in which capacity he showed himself to be well fitted having conducted a large and prosperous business for a large number of years. He also as a general merchant in Georgetown had a large interest in the lobster industry having control of several factories till they were merged into the Eastern Canneries, Limited, of which he became a large shareholder. He was also very active in provincial politics and was Liberal candidate for the House of Assembly several times for his native constituency of Georgetown but as it was always a strong Conservative Constituency he very naturally was unsuccessful in that line.
