Abbies Win Over Dorchester 11-9

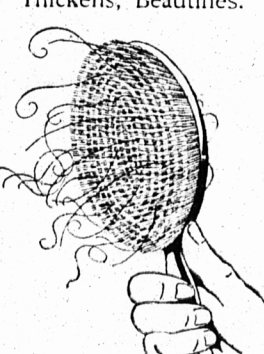
