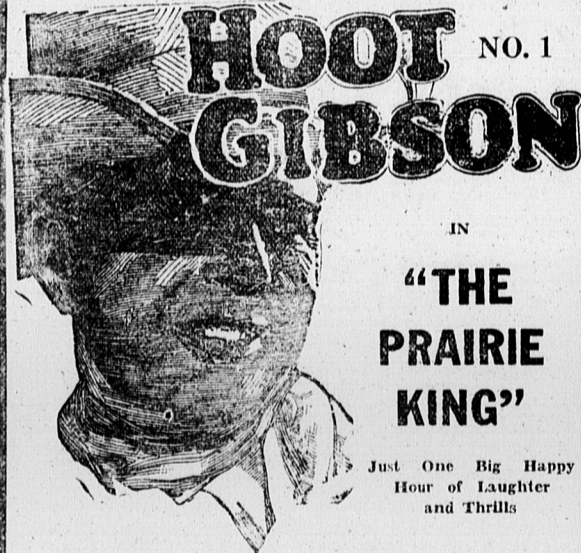

Popular and effective methods by which orchids, ermine and diamonds are separated from butter-and-egg men by New York's efficient army of blonde and brunette gold excavators are revealed with laughter in Colleen Moore's "Orchids and Ermine", the first National Picture which came to the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday. This human and humorous story of what happened to one little New York hotel telephone operator who fell in love with a millionaire traveling incognito as his own valet, poses good natured fun at the clove-and-garlic and henfruit merchants, in addition to being charmingly convincing and appealing as the operator, Miss Moore runs the switchboard as though she had done it all her life.

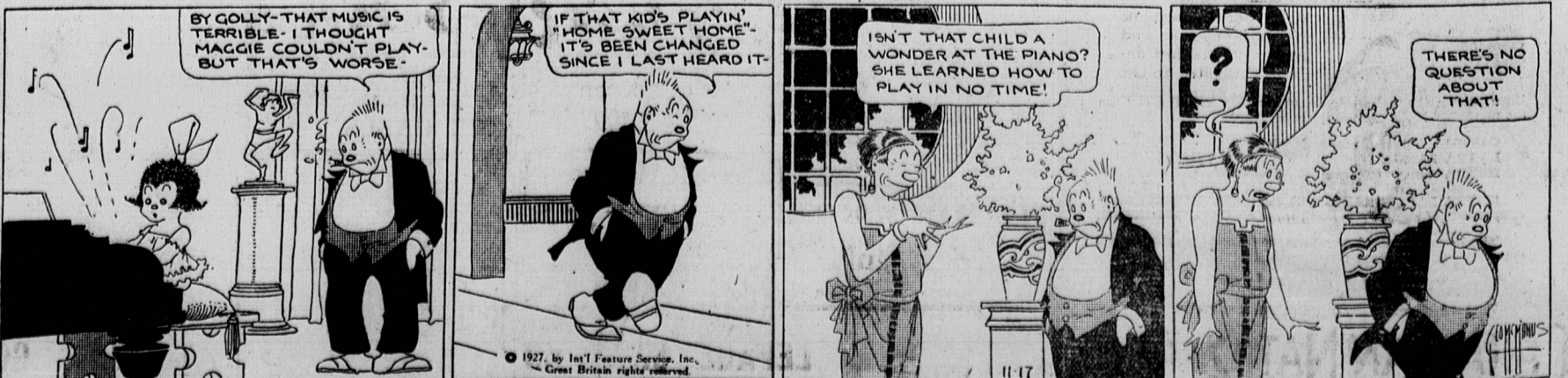

IN MEMORIAM

MR. PETER McDONALD.

On Oct. 2nd, 1927, after an illness extending over some five weeks, there passed to his rest one of the oldest residents, and the oldest business man, in the village of Crapaud, Mr. Peter McDonald, aged almost 79 years.

Mr. McDonald was the eldest son of the late Joseph and Mrs. McDonald of Crapaud, and he established the saddlery business in which he was engaged when taken ill, about the year 1870.

During all these years he was the possessor of a business reputation absolutely above reproach. As a consistent, faithful member of St. John's Church, he was always in his place at the services, and always took a very hearty interest in its welfare. Possibly it was his deep rooted affection for the House of God, and for the things of God, that furnished the background for his well balanced life; his well balanced character, and his high ideals. He will be sorely missed in the community, in the Church, and in the home.

He is survived by two daughters, Phoebe at home and Mrs. P.H. Cross of Boston, and by four sons, Joseph, Walter and Lloyd of Seattle, Wash.; and Wilmot at home.

Also by three sisters, Mrs. Newman, of Tryon; Mrs. Charles and Mrs. George Dunsford of DeSable, and two brothers, Robert and Joseph of Crapaud. The funeral was held in St. John's Church and conducted by the Rector, on Oct. 5, 1927, where a very large number of people had gathered to pay their respects to a kind friend and old neighbor.

The bearers were Messrs. Robert and Joseph McDonald; George Dunsford; Donald McKinnon; W. H. Inman and Joseph Haslam.

The following verses were incorporated in the Memoriam to Mrs. McDonald, who predeceased her husband some nine years, and as they seem very appropriate, they are used again here.

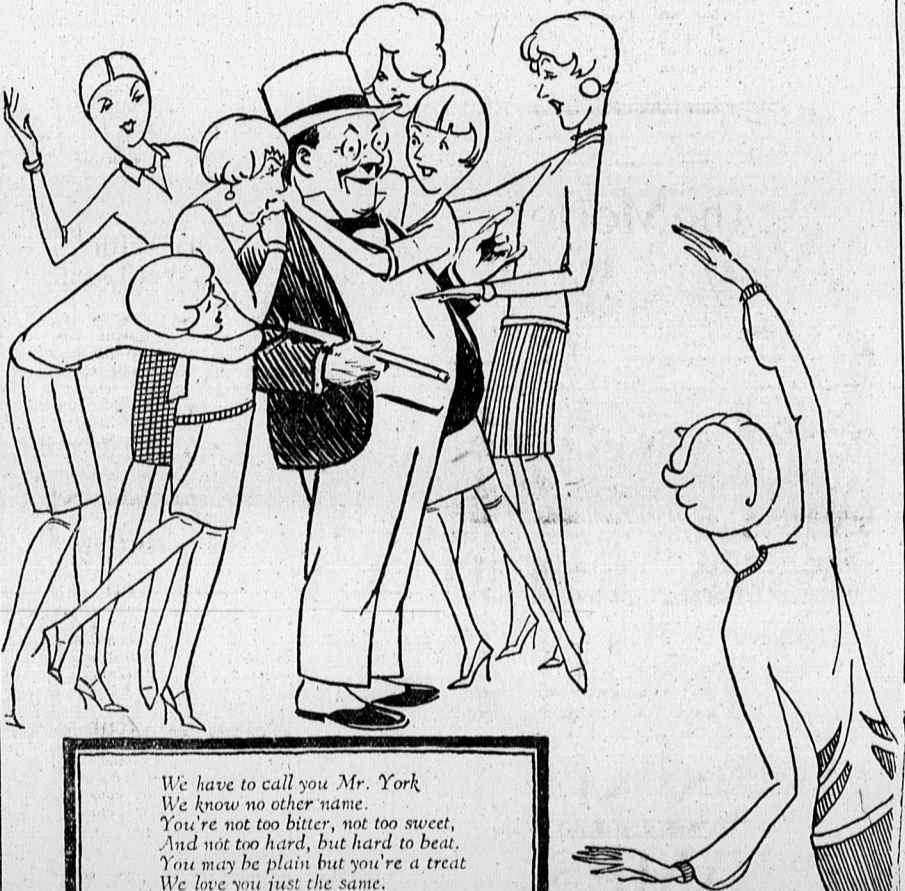
—Consolation—

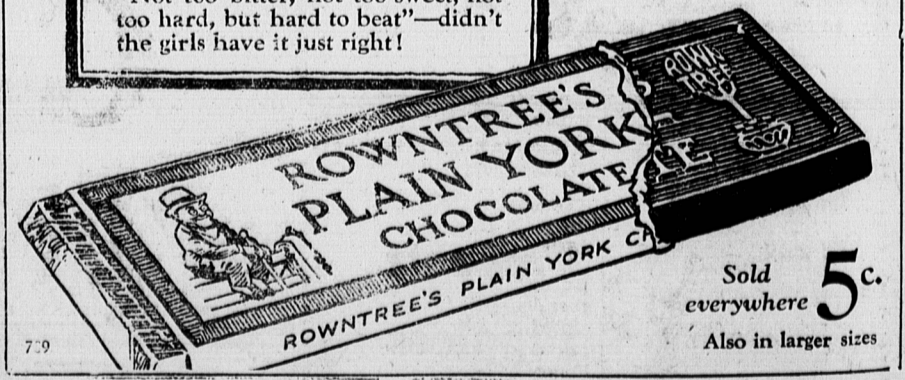
