

Moncton Team Wins Mar. Title

C. C. J. A. Sextet Captures Intermediate Championship, Defeating Victoria Unions 1 to Nil, And 4 to 2 In The Series.

The "Flying Frenchmen", Moncton Catholic Club Junior Hockey Association annexed the Maritime Intermediate hockey championship by defeating Victoria Unions in their home rink last night by a score of 1 to nil and winning the two game series 4 to 2.

It was a cagey band of visiting hockeyists that forced the P. E. I.-N. S. champions last night in the crucial test for the flag. Scoring the only count of the night five minutes from the opening whistle in the first period, the C. C. J. A. sextet immediately went on the defensive and notwithstanding herculean efforts put forth, the Unions were unable to batter down the stiffest and most impregnable barrier thrown up before them this year.

It was a heart-breaking struggle for both teams, especially the Island aggregation, which combined times without number to the mouth of the Moncton net, only to be turned back by "Big Chief" Cummins, the sixty minute stumbling block that thwarted and out-guessed the Islanders at every turn of the card.

It has been a goodly number of years since these parts witnessed such phenomenal net minding. Cummins was "on" in every sense of the word last night, stopping wicked shots from every angle and taking them with the ease and grace of a Forbæ. The last period was the busiest, turning away in all 24 markers, while his team mates tallied one drive at the Union net. In the three periods, this classy net wizard correlated forty drives at his citadel without letting one go by.

Although most of the credit goes to the "Chief", his teammates, by a remarkable exhibition of defense play, helped in no small way to pave the way for the well earned win.

It was Murphy's shot from the wing, five minutes in the first stanza that rang the bell for Moncton. He took a perfect pass from Bourdeau fast centre, after a great combination play, to cage the rubber for the lone register.

The work of Stewart, Pidgeon, McLeod and Miller stood out prominently on the homesters lineup last night, while the remainder of the team, including their great little goalie, W. McLeod turned in a stellar performance.

The ice last night was in perfect condition, notwithstanding the recent mild weather. A record crowd were in attendance.

The set-to was productive of only one penalty, Murphy, first period, which easily signifies how clean the game really was.

officer and member of the force shall have authority to act as a constable throughout the Province. Every officer and member shall be deemed to be a Peace Officer with power and authority to investigate breaches of Provincial Statutes and offenses under the Criminal Code of Canada, and shall have the power of Peace Officers and Constables with regard to the arrest and detention of offenders. The Commissioners and officers so appointed shall be ex officio constables under the P. E. Island Fish and Game Protection Act, the Prohibition Act and the Highway Traffic Act.

Section 14 reads as follows: "14. (1) A member of the force or any person acting under instructions given by the Attorney General or Commissioner of Police shall not be convicted for a violation of any Provincial Act if it is made to appear to a Justice or Magistrate before whom the complaint is heard that the person charged with any such offence committed the same pursuant to such instructions for the purpose of obtaining evidence.

"(2) A certificate that the person so charged was acting under such instructions purporting to be signed by the Attorney General or Commissioner of Police without proof of such signature shall be accepted by any Justice of the Peace or Magistrate before whom such person may be charged as conclusive evidence of the fact that such person so charged was duly instructed under the provisions of sub-section 1."

Mr. Arsenault suggested there was danger in giving these officials too much power. It has been admitted by the Government that a good many prohibition officers were unfit for their duty. The Legislature has no power of appointment. By this Act we empower these officers.

Mr. McLure pointed out that last fall a detective was appointed. He would be appointed under this Act if it were in force at that time. On Mr. McLure's motion Clause 14

was allowed to stand over. Clause 15 reads:

"15. The Lieutenant Governor in Council may make such rules and regulations from time to time with respect to the office of the Commissioner of Police and with respect to the Prince Edward Island Provincial Police and officers appointed for the enforcement of any Statute of Prince Edward Island as he may deem expedient and providing for such clerical and other assistance and for accommodation and office equipment for any such officer as he may deem expedient and may also make rules and regulations determining their duties and the manner in which such duties shall be performed."

Mr. McLure asked if the Provincial Treasurer would have to pay all these officers and provide equipment? For instance there are 15 prohibition officers today. Would the Province have to take over their expenditures?

Hon. Mr. Lea said the Clause gives the Lieutenant Governor power to do so, but they already had the power to do so "as they may deem expedient." There was nothing in this clause that was not already provided for.

Clause 15 passed. The Committee reported progress on the bill, asking leave to sit again. The following bills were given third reading and passed:

An Act to amend the Succession Duty Act.

An Act respecting the Registration of Wills relating to the Title of Lands in Prince County.

An Act to Incorporate and Establish in Charlottetown a Home for Aged Protestant Ladies.

An Act for the Prevention of Frauds in connection with the Sale of Securities.

At 5.40 p. m. the House took recess until 8 p. m.

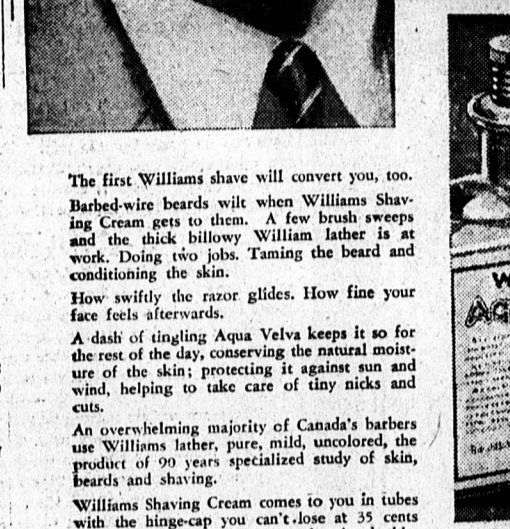

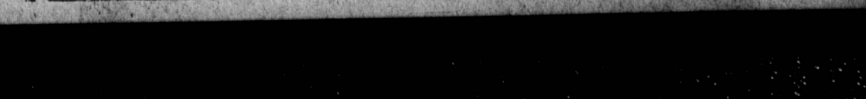
