FREDERICTON, August 9 (Special) The Peoples Bank of Fredericton has been sold and the Bank of Montreal is the purchaser.

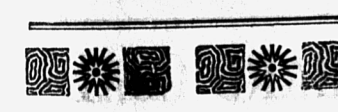
RECEPTION TO BE GIVEN FIREMEN

SIGNING THE INDIAN ATY

OTTAWA, Aug. 8--Commissioner McKenna, of the Indian Department, will leave for Winnipeg in a few days to negotiate Treaty No. 10, with the North-west Indians, by which the Crees and Chippewaugans will surrender their title to a stretch of country to the north and northwest of Alberta and Saskatchewan, which will then be handed over to the newly formed Provinces.

WORK FOR METHODIST CONFERENCE

MONTREAL, Aug. 8--The General Conference of the Methodist Church at its quadrennial session in Montreal next month will be required to make several important appointments. A successor to Rev. Dr. Henderson, the Association missionary Secretary who is resigning that position to accept the pastorate of the Dominion Methodist church at Ottawa will be appointed. The selection of an editor of the Christian Guardian, Rev. Dr. Bond being compelled by ill health to relinquish his editorial duties will be necessary for six years. Rev. W. B. Creighton, B. A. B. D. has acted as Associate Editor and for nearly a year has performed the duties of editor. Many names have been mentioned for the position among them being Rev. Dr. Crews, Rev. Dr. Rose and Rev. Dr. McLean and the present acting editor.

MONTREAL IS TO HAVE NEW BRIDGE

Across St. Lawrence, Construction Begins Next Week, to be Completed in Two Years-- Bridge of Long Span, Five Rail Tracks Two Roadways and Footpaths.

MONTREAL, Aug. 9 (Special)--A new cantilever bridge to connect Montreal with the south shore of the St. Lawrence is announced for commencement next week and for completion in two years. The bridge will have a main span of 1500 feet and a clear heading of 150 feet.

ZION IN DEBT FIVE MILLIONS

CHICAGO, Aug. 8--The first detailed statement of the indebtedness of Zion City was given to the investors at a meeting last night. The tables showed a total of nearly \$5,000,000 which it is proposed by Overseer W. G. Voliva to pay by funding the entire indebtedness for 18 years, and to issue bonds bearing 6 per cent interest. The proposition was accepted by an almost unanimous vote of the 87 investors present, there being but two dissenting votes.

WASHINGTON WILL EXPRESS REGRETS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8--Although taking the position that the killing of the five Japanese poachers within the territorial limits of the United States in Alaska is just, the government in all probability will extend to Japan its regrets for the fatal clash between the native look-out of the North American Commercial Company and the Japanese raiders. This statement was made by Acting Secretary of State Bacon tonight. Meantime, the district attorney for Alaska is making preparations for the speedy trial of the 12 Japanese who were taken prisoners. The prompt action of this government today in notifying Ambassador Wright at Tokyo of the facts as reported by Solicitor Sims, of the department of commerce and labor, was designed to give to Japan information first hand of occurrence. After a careful investigation by the Japanese charge here, the conclusion was reached that the case was one involving an international incident.

FRENCH BUY BIG BLOCKS G.T.R.

MONTREAL, August 8--"There is a rapidly increasing interest being taken in France in Canadian securities," said Mr. Kierzkowski, Consul General of the Republic, this morning on his return from his summer trip home. "It is difficult to trace, because most of the business is done by way of London. But I have seen enough of it myself to be able to judge of the progress made by Canadian securities in the favor of French investors. I know of one extremely wealthy man in Paris, who is taking one-fifth of the entire capital stock of the Grand Trunk Pacific--a security which is very favorably regarded there."

Mr. Kierzkowski returned for the purpose of being present at the visit to Canada of the French war vessels, and will probably go down to Rimouski about the tenth. He is in excellent health except for slight fatigue from travelling, and will be in attendance at his office to-morrow.
