**IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF CONVENTION**

WOLFVILLE, Aug. 29.—More than 400 delegates and visitors were in attendance at the meetings of the United Baptist Convention here. The president, Rev. E. H. Cochrane, Saint John, called the convention to order. The devotion: a leader for the convention was Dr. F. W. Patterson, President of Acadia university, who delivered an address on The Idea of God. Dr. H. E. Stillwell, secretary, presented the report of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board. The present standing of the mission in Bolivia is set forth as follows: include Reekle college, under Principal Haddow and Miss Alice Clarke, which has had a good year with 126 in attendance, and two schools for Aymara Indians at Penit Hill farm with 150 pupils. There are eight Sunday Schools with 600 pupils, an increase over last year of nearly 200. There have been 49 Baptisms, the largest number in any one year of mission's history. There are 249 church members, 47 percent of the present total having been added in the last three years.

The Standing

The standing of the mission in India is thus summed up: Missionaries, in active service and on furlough, 22 men, 22 wives and 45 single ladies Indian; Christian colleagues, 112 pastors, 72 preachers and evangelists, 18 colporteurs, 179 bible women, 519 men and 197 women teachers, with 103 medical assistants, in all an increase of 101 over last year; Church members, 109 churches, 22 being self-supporting, 23,138 members living in 861 villages, 18 more villages than last year, and contributing \$11,000; villages and the gospel, of about 6,000 villages in the Canadian Baptist territory, there are Christians in 861, while about 600 other villages have the gospel preached in them, three out of four villages untouched; Sunday Schools, 877 schools, 1,012 teachers and 20,165 pupils; schools, village schools number 579, 35 more than last year, with an average attendance of 18,271 boys and girls, 14 boarding schools, with 705 boys and 590 girls; medical figures, nine hospitals and 12 dispensaries, with 4,301 in patients, 49,094 out patients, 98,513 treatments, and 3,194 operations, two leper homes, with 206 inmates; women's work, single lady missionaries and missionaries wives have visited during the year 7,095 Hindu and Mohammedan homes, 2,715 outcast homes, and 3,466 Christian homes in 1,653 villages, of which nearly 800 have no Christians living in them; Baptisms, 2,090, as compared with 2,036 last year; present membership, 23,138.

**NATION-WIDE SACRIFICES COUNTED ON BY SNOWDEN**

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The "Iron Chancellor" of Britain is confident that nation-wide sacrifice will save the country from its present financial emergency. Philip Snowden, crippled, who determined to devote his life to the interests of the people while he was recovering from the accident that made him lame for life, believes that the inherent soundness of the British financial position and the spirit of her people will see things through. The veteran Chancellor, now 67, and with temples of gray, expressed his faith in a national willingness to sacrifice whatever may be necessary. "This country is especially dependent upon the maintenance of confidence in international credit and international exchanges," he said. "Recent weakening of confidence in sterling, withdrawal by foreign countries of their credits in London, and the great loss of gold reserves, if continued, would quickly reduce currency. The falling value of currency naturally reduces its purchasing power, and it is at this point that such lack of confidence affects everybody."

**WILL RECORDED BY GRAMOPHONE** (British United Press) LONDON, August, 29.—For the first time in legal history, it is believed, a will has been made by phonograph. Major Stone of the British Broadcasting Company dictated his will into a microphone. Two others announced that they had been witnesses of the making of the will. All three signed the wax disc on which the sounds waves of their own voices were engraved.

"The chief reason why there has been the nervousness in other countries about British credit," he continued, "is that the impression got abroad that our National financial position, that is the budgetary position of the country, was not satisfactory. "A country is like an individual. It can not keep in a solvent position forever if expenditure exceeds income. "That is the reason why economy of national expenditure is essential to make both ends meet. The present crisis has arisen through a weakness of international confidence in Great Britain's financial stability. But the position of our country is fundamentally sound. "We have vast resources, and all that is needed to restore confidence abroad is the evidence that we are placing our national finances on a thoroughly sound basis," the Chancellor said.

Welsh, manager the Baptist Book Room, Toronto; Rev. H. Dixon Smith, Missionary from India; Rev. A. B. Lorimer, D.D. New York; and Rev. E. M. Blakney, Pittsburgh, Pa. Rev. C. Wellington Camp, D. D., moved the adoption of the report urging the completion of the Keeping Faith Campaign. Rev. G. W. Guioi, Fredericton, seconded the motion stressing the achievements in India and Bolivia.

**BRINGS GREETING**

Rev. Arthur C. Baldwin, D.D., of Philadelphia, a fraternal delegate from the Northern Baptists convention brought the greetings of that body. W. G. Clark of Fredericton was elected president of the convention on fourth ballot; assistant secretaries, Rev. Arthur Akery, Rev. J. Fred Cowan; convention treasurer, principal Ernest Robinson; committee on resolutions, Revs. A. S. Bishop, L. E. Ackland, Neil McLean, Donald Dron, W. C. Cross, E. E. Daley, A. C. Vincent, J. M. Blesedell. Rev. H. R. Boyer, D.D., presented the report on denominational funds, showing total monies raised for denominational enterprise \$121,651.57, of the amount \$41,086.16 came from the W. M. Societies, \$5,273.08 from mission bands and \$7,912.78 legacies.

**MORE ACCURATE BOMBING**

(British United Press) LONDON, August 29.—New types of bombing aeroplanes and apparatus designed to ensure accuracy in bombing from the air will be tested during the next few months by the Royal Air Force. The introduction of the new day bomber "Hart" is said to be of critical importance in the development of bombing tactics. It is fifty percent faster than the older types. "Sidestrand" is slower machine, but it has two engines and ensures greater accuracy. A new bomb gear and an indicator which enables the pilot to keep the machine perfectly level whether in clear air or mist, will also be tested.

**NEW BRITISH AEROPLANE FOR CANADA** (British United Press) LONDON, Aug. 29.—Canada soon is to see a New British aeroplane designed especially for Canadian conditions, and intended for use as a fast mail and transport machine in the Dominion. It is the Avro Mailplane, with an Armstrong Siddeley Panther II 625 H.P. engine, and was built after its designers had closely investigated Canadian and American flying conditions and requirements. The Mailplane is a single-bay bi-plane with a 600-mile range at high cruising speed. Its maximum speed at sea-level is 170 m. p. h.; 3,000 feet, 170 m. p. h.; at 5,000 feet 168 m. p. h. at 10,000 feet, 160 m. p. h.; at 15,000 feet, 149 m. p. h. Its landing speed is 66 m. p. h. Its cruising speed at 3,000 feet is 147 m. p. h. Its ceiling is 19,000 feet. Full night-flying equipment, including navigation lights, retractable landing and flood lighting for instrument board is provided. Provision is made for the installation of radio beacon apparatus. It was shipped to Canada on a boat which sailed August 23, and will be assembled at Ottawa, where it is expected, the first demonstrations will be made. The pilot will be F. B. Tomkins. Afterwards demonstrations and flights will be made at other centres.
