Liquor Traffic in Russia.

The Russian government has for a num-
ber of years been trying to devise some
way of limiting the ruinous use of liquor
among the laboring classes, or, as the
Minister of Finance put it, "to save the
population from the baneful influence of
the in-keepers, who, in order to make
large profits, adulterated their spirit with
noxious substances which were proving
ruinous to the lower classes. The public
houses were acknowledged to be the most
powerful agents of ruin and disorganiza-
tion in the economic life of the Russian
people and threatened the impoverish-
ment of the whole agricultural popula-
tion."

One of the first things done by the gov-
ernment was to confine the sale of liquor
to places where food was required to be
furnished with each order for liquor.
Severe penalties were provided for selling
on credit, for receiving articles in pawn
for drink, or for bartering produce of
future labor for it. Loss of license was
the penalty for evasion or violation of the
law.

Fifteen years ago it was first proposed
that the government assume control of
the sale of liquor; but the annual revenue
from licenses at that time amounted to
\$175,000,000. That seemed too big a part
of the revenue to dispense with. Nine
years ago the great famine revealed a
state of things which called for some rad-
ical reform. The present system, which
has already been introduced in half the
empire, including thirty-five provinces,
with a population of 61,000,000, does not
aim to increase the revenues, but to pre-
vent such abuses as are "directly attrib-
utable to bad liquor and the excessive use
of it and improving the morality and
prosperity of the masses." The govern-
ment determines both the quantity and
the quality of the spirits manufactured,
purchases a large proportion, and permits
the sale of the remainder only under
strict regulation.

Under the lead of Prince Oldenberg of
St. Petersburg a particularly enlightened
scheme of preventive agencies has been
organized. The plan is to open reading-
rooms with libraries and cheap, attractive
restaurants near public gardens and
squares where the working people con-
gregate. The movement has grown re-
markably, until now there are nearly 2,000
of these tea-rooms and tea-restaurants,
943 reading-rooms and libraries, 654 pop-
ular readings in hired halls, and many
other similar popular attractions.
The conviction that the most serious
hindrance to Russia's progress lies in the
twin relics of barbarism, illiteracy and in-
temperance among the peasant classes,
freely expressed by the leading news-
papers of Russia, is giving power to the
reform movement. It is expected that
the scheme of Government monopoly and
control of the liquor traffic will within a
year or two be extended into all the sev-
enty-five provinces.
