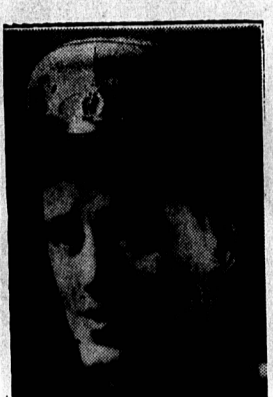

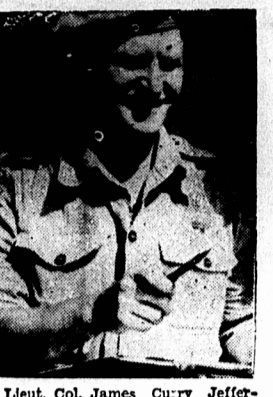

Pipe and Brass Bands Heard in Open Air Concert

A rare treat in Pipe and Brass Band music was given to thousands of citizens in Queen Square Gardens last night by the Canadian Women's Pipe and Brass Band which are on a tour of the Dominion.

Over one hundred members of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Women's Pipe and Brass Band, under the leadership of Mrs. E. M. Bagnall, members of the staff of the C.A.B.T.C. and citizens welcomed them on their arrival. The parade from the depot to Queen Square took the following order—C.W.A.C. Brass Band led by Bandmaster Nedie Sarrich, the Pipe Band led by Pipe Major Lillian M. Grant followed by four sections of the Red Cross Corps under command of Mrs. E. M. Bagnall. They marched via Weymouth, Kent, Queen and Grafton streets to Queen Square where the Brass Band played for a march. The Bandstand while the Pipe Band took over the area near by fenced off for their use.

The concert opened with the playing of "O Canada" by the Brass Band followed by a march. Alternately the Pipe and Brass Band played marches, waltzes and overtures.

The C.A.B.T.C. band was present and played several selections. Lieut. Jels, recruiting officer for the C.W.A.C., gave an interesting talk on the work of the Women's Army Corps and stressed the need of more recruits.

Following the concert the band members were given a luncheon at the Canadian Legion and were then taken to quarters at the C.A.B.T.C.

The two bands, which are under the direction of Lt. Anne Veronica Lendrum, will leave here Saturday morning.

to Port Hill to a car accident. Met a car at Grandriver Ferry. Havelock McLean and Bannerman McDougal were in the car. Mr. McDougal and Mr. McLean were suffering from shock. No pulse was felt. Both were conscious. Asked ambulance to go to scene of accident and returned to hospital where Havelock McLean was operated for fracture of pelvis, also some bones of spine. Dr. Grant said he gave shock treatment and also blood transfusions at once. In his opinion cause of death was shock, multiple fracture of pelvis and hemorrhage of the brain. Could have been caused by collision or by being thrown against some object. Had no reason to doubt but that McDougal was in good physical condition previous to accident; also treated Bannerman McDougal who had pronounced heart condition. The following verdict was brought in "The death of Havelock McLean is the result of injuries sustained while driving in an automobile bearing a P. E. I. license plate No. 787-444 on the evening of Sept. 22nd, 1943, at Port Hill near the gateway leading to the residence of W. J. Montgomery." Thomas Carruthers Foreman, Earl Compney, Chester Palmer, George Bowens, William Dennis, Henry Yeo, Ernest G. Ellis. A similar verdict was brought in the case of A. Bannerman McDougal.—8.

Evidence at Port Hill Inquest

Following is a more extended account of the evidence taken at the inquest at Port Hill Wednesday night into the deaths of Havelock McLean and A. Bannerman McDougal, following a collision with a car at Port Hill on Sept. 7. The first witness was W. J. Montgomery, who was driving the car which struck the car of Havelock McLean. He was driving about 35 miles per hour. It was fairly dusty on Northam Road. Near W. J. Montgomery he met Alvin McLean's car. He did not notice how many were in the car. Visibility was poor because of dust. After the collision he visited the scene and looked at the car of Alvin McLean. He saw Alvin McLean under the steering wheel on the side of him. He did not pay much attention to other car but went to phone for aid.

Mr. J. Watson in charge of Summerside detachment R. C. M. P. sworn on Sept. 7th as a result of a telephone call from Constable Palmer and himself went to Port Hill and arrived at the point on the highway where an auto accident had occurred. He learned occupants of both cars badly injured and were receiving medical attention. Constable Palmer and himself examined the cars. Both very much damaged, total wrecks. No marks noticeable on the road. Mr. Grant, sworn, Friday, Sept. 7th, he was called to the scene.
