CANADIANS ARE COMING HOME FROM U. S. A. TO AVOID ARREST The new immigration law amendments of the United States, which come into effect next July 1, will have no mercy on those who are in the States illegally, according to Emil Sauer, American counsel in Toronto, when he informed the press that Canadians are now beginning to return to Canada to obtain legal entry papers.

Deportation will be the fate of all those who fall into the net which American immigration authorities will spread in order to apprehend those guilty of illegal entry. Mr. Sauer stated that all Canadians who have made illegal entry into the United States are being given a chance to leave that country and report to the nearest consular office, where they will be able to receive their visas. There will probably be no record in Toronto of the Canadians who return here, as the consular office is treating them as if they were ordinary Canadians making application for visas. The number is beginning to increase, however, and from now on larger groups are expected.
