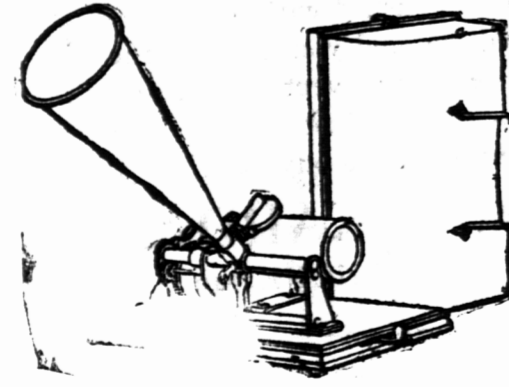

OBITUARY—Fell asleep in Jesus at Fountain Road, New London, Oct. 13, 1903 Adam McKay in the 90th year of his age. Deceased was born in Sutherlandshire, Scotland in 1814 and came with his parents who emigrated to this Island in 1815 and settled at Stanley Bridge where he spent his youth. About 60 years ago he moved to Fountain Road. He was 47 years an elder in the Presbyterian Church and was always while health permitted found in his place in church and prayer meeting. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. E. McDonald, minister at Cavendish and Stanley Bridge. The large concourse of people who attended to pay the last tribute of respect to the deceased bore ample testimony to the esteem in which he was held during his long life time. He was in possession of all his faculties to the last and until about four months previous to his death was hale and hearty. His partner in life died seven years ago. His death has caused a blank in the community. He was a friend and associate of the late Murdoch McLod and McKay Campbell, devout disciples of Christ and the prayer meeting, and but few men can be found as well versed in the scriptures as they. They were devout lay readers who studied the Scriptures and Boston's Four Fold State. These men lay great stress upon self examination and self knowledge and this excellent knowledge was manifest in the calm and easy manner of Mr. McKay's life.
