**STEAMER FINED FOR GROSS NEGLIGENCE**  
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—Penalties aggregating \$7,960 were today imposed by the Department of Commerce upon the British steamer Orteric charged with what the Department characterized as the worst case of neglect of stowage passengers ever brought under the passenger act of 1882.  
 The penalized vessel was employed to carry Spanish and Portuguese immigrants through Magellan Straits to Honolulu. Among the 1242 passengers there were in the eight weeks of her voyage 58 deaths, 57 being children. The births numbered 14. The investigation further revealed that the sexes were not properly segregated.
