AN ACTION AGAINST UNDERGROUND

PRACTICAL PROBLEMS IN ARITHMETIC—

SIR,—I have lately been using in my class a little volume, entitled "Practical Problems in Arithmetic," by G. J. McCormac, Inspector of Public Schools, Prince Edward Island.

As Mr. McCormac has written voluminously for the Press on Educational and other topics, and is moreover a poet of no mean fame, I began the use of this book, feeling confident that it would be found to possess considerable merit; but I have ceased using it, thoroughly disappointed, as its demerits and errors are legion, notwithstanding that the last paragraph of the Preface reads as follows:—"My thanks are due to Alexander Anderson, Esq., L. L. D., Chief Superintendent of Education for P. E. Island, for many valuable suggestions given me while engaged at this work, also for his kindness in revising the complete manuscript, and assurances of his approval of the Problems for use in the public schools of Prince Edward Island."

As evidence of his promised approval, Dr. Anderson has recommended this book for supplementary work, for Prince of Wales College Matriculation examinations.

I think that not only some of the leading teachers of P. E. Island, at whose urgent request the work was compiled, but Dr. Anderson also, who has so emphatically stamped it with his seal of approval, have committed a great wrong against the teachers and pupils, by the assistance they have given in imposing this book upon them.

As Dr. Anderson's ability in dealing with matters of this kind and his energy and good judgement as Superintendent of Education are well known in every part of this province, it is to me incredible that he has revised the "complete" manuscript or any part thereof.

The Author claims that:—"All the work given to the Arithmetic class should be practical. It should be for the most part arithmetic dealing with the affairs of life. It should be presented in an interesting manner as possible, and the pupils should be required to direct their attention more to things and their relations and less to the figures used in the solution." Do the following questions come up to the standard in these respects?

1. Of how many variations will the 23 letters of the alphabet admit?

2. Jacob, by contract was to serve Lybau for his two daughters 14 years: When he had occupied 10 yrs. 10 mos. 10 wks. 10 dys. 10 hrs. 10 mins. how many minutes had he then to serve?

3. In the sentence, "Of all the saws that ever I saw saw, I never saw a saw saw as my saw saws."

What percentage of the letters are consonants, what percentage of the words are nouns, and by how much per cent do the total number of the letters in the verbs exceed the total number of the letters in the nouns? These are but a few among many others equally ridiculous.

Again, on page 23 there are seven questions, the answers to five at least of which are incorrect, owing evidently to incorrect methods of work, and not to a printer's error, as anyone who will take the trouble to make an examination of these questions can readily verify. For instance, take question No. 4. Other pages will be found equally as bad in this respect. In question 8 page 19, the agent's commission is reckoned to him instead of on the amount actually invested, hence the error in the answer. Nearly every page is loaded with errors and incongruities of various kinds.

It would certainly require considerable "schoolish dexterity in manipulating figures and finding answers" to solve some of the "riddles" which we are asked to guess, and to find some of the answers, which the author has found. One would necessarily require a greater "understanding of the principles, or even the meaning of figures" than the author has displayed, if correct answers are to be obtained. I have always been under the impression that inaccuracy is the great defect in the arithmetical work of our schools. I fear that we have not yet been supplied with the panacea for this ill. We had too many text books on arithmetic, even before this new star appeared in the arithmetical firmament.

STATION BROKEN INTO.

CORNWALL, Feb. 4.—The New York & Ottawa Railway station was broken into last night for the third time in as many years. On the first occasion the safe was blown up and several hundred dollars taken. Last night entrance was made by breaking two windows. There was no money in the till.

CANT EXTEND TIME.

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—A report has been received at the Department of Trade and Commerce from Mr. Jardine, South Africa. Mr. Jardine encloses a letter from Sir Percy Girouard stating that the time cannot be extended for receiving tenders for material for South African railways.
