WOMEN SCORE ISLAND IN ELECTIONS

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(Canadian and Associated Press Cable)—Eight women, all Conservative, won seats in the House of Commons in early returns from the election.

Leading the list was lady Astor, who was re-elected from Plymouth. It was a woman, Miss Irene Ward, who defeated Miss Margaret Bondfield, the first woman to hold a portfolio in the British Cabinet. Miss Bondfield resigned as Minister of Labor in the change of Government that gave Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald a National Ministry to deal with Great Britain's economic ills.

The other women known to have been elected are Lady Ivelgh, Mrs. Ida Copeland, who defeated Sir Oswald Mosley, founder of the "New Party," Miss Mary Pockford, London Political leader; Miss F. M. Graves, a writer, and Miss Florence Horsburgh, who defeated the only prohibitionist member of parliament in Dundee, Scotland.

Besides Miss Bondfield, two other Labor women members of Parliament were known to have lost their seats. They are Miss Ellen Wilkinson, one of the best known women in the Labor movement, and Mrs. Mary Hamilton.

There were 5 women members in the last Parliament, all of whom stood for reelection, with the exception of Lady Cynthia Mosley, wife of Sir Oswald.

Another woman Conservative, Mrs. H. R. Tate, defeated S. P. Viant, former assistant Postmaster General in the late Labor Government. Mrs. Tate is quoted as having said:

"Half the problems of discontented homes would be solved if women thoroughly understood cooking."

FALL RIVER, Mass., Oct. 28.—Three firemen were overcome and the business district temporarily threatened late yesterday by a fire of undetermined origin which broke out in the basement of a four-story business building on north Main street. The building houses consisted of an auto supply concern, doctor's offices, a photographic studio and lodge rooms. The flames were not under control shortly before midnight and the damage at that time was set at \$50,000.

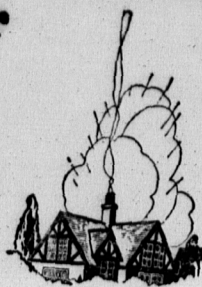

Canada Second In National Racing Meet

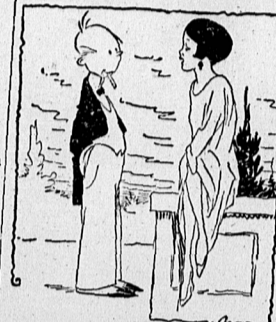

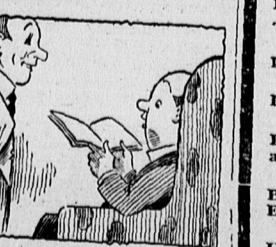
The City of Stamford, plying from Bridgeport and Stamford with freight, apparently split in two after striking a sand scow, rescuers said.
