Which will be Given by Mr. Conklin in Kindergarten To-night

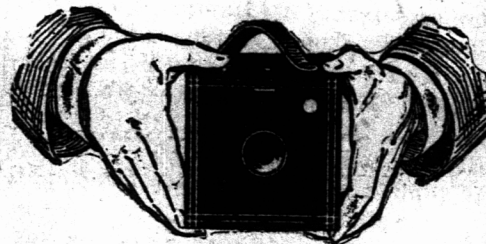
