The annual examination of Pownal school was held on 28th June, in the presence of a number of parents and visitors. There was a good attendance of pupils, and they were thoroughly examined in the different branches by Mrs. Cameron Acorn, Miss McLaughlin (teacher of Alexandra School) Mr. Chowan, and the teacher (Mr. McGregor). The ready answers to the numerous questions on the different subjects elicited the admiration of all present. A unique part of the examination was the giving of fifty words (not taken from the school books) to be written by the pupils, 4th, 5th and 6th grade contested. As many as 42 words were spelled correctly. Then sums were put on the blackboard. (Prizes were offered for quickness and accuracy) time was taken and busy brains went to work. The first to finish was Milton Acorn in 7 min. (one slight mistake.) second Harry Jones, 9 min., correct; Annie Praught, 10 min., correct; Lillian Jenkins, 12 1/2 min., correct; those four also spelled most words correctly, and each received a cash prize. The adding of long columns of figures ought to be practised more in our schools than it is. A pleasing part was a drill in physical exercises, great proficiency was shown in these manoeuvres which reflect credit on the teacher and is telling with good effect on the bearing of the children. Mr. McGregor also trains the boys in Military tactics after school hours; he has procured rifles for each one and already they go through the drill like veterans. They also have football and basket ball. At the close a number of short but highly complimentary speeches were made all noting and praising the splendid order maintained. God Save the King ended the program. The sum of \$50.00 was voted as supplement to Mr. McGregor.
