

Noted Author On N. B. Fishing Trip

MONTREAL, Que., June 21.—Though he has landed ounancla trout and various other kinds of fighting fish, Rex Beach, noted author and sportsman has never tackled the lordly salmon of the New Brunswick streams, so this morning on his arrival at Bonaventure Station en route to Kedgwick, N. B., Mr. Beach was more than thrilled with the possibilities of hooking into a big one on the pools of the famous Restigouche.

The author was one of a party of four New York fishermen who reached Montreal this morning over Canadian National Railways en route to New Brunswick where they will fish for four days in the public waters of the famous Restigouche.

The other members of the party were Fred Fletcher, Rod and Gun Editor of the New York Herald-Tribune, Gene Byrnes, artist and creator of the Regular Fellows cartoon strip and G. F. Aiken, a big game fisherman, who has held sail fish and tuna fishing records in various waters.

The party are spending the day in Montreal and will leave tonight on the Ocean Limited of the Canadian National for Kedgwick, from where they will be outfitted to go into the Restigouche under the auspices of the tourist department of the Nova Scotia Government. Two motion picture men will accompany the party for the purpose of making a one reel film of their angling adventures on the famous stream.

Also bound for the Restigouche for salmon fishing, J. S. Cosden and party of New York arrived in their private car, the "Hussar" over the Canadian National lines this morning and continued their journey to Kedgwick, N. B., on the Maritime Express.

Labor Member Joins Conservatives

LONDON, June 21.—Dr. Haden Guest, who resigned from the Labor party and his seat as Labor representative for North Warwick in the House of Commons last year, has written to Premier Stanley Baldwin announcing his intention of joining the Conservative party in consequence of a tour he made of Canada, Australia and South Africa which, he declares, reinforced his belief in the future of the Empire as a political unit and as a co-operating economic organization. He also states he is confirmed in his view that the Labor party is leading its members to a sidetrack which is surrounded by political, social and economic difficulties.

FROM FOURTH STOREY WINDOW BUT MAY LIVE

MONTON, June 21.—W. E. B. Starr, of Rotheray, representative of the Royal Securities Corporation of Saint John, is a patient in the City Hospital suffering from severe injuries as the result of his jumping from the window of his room on the fourth storey of the Brunswick Hotel. Mr. Starr, who is a veteran of the World War, has not been in the best of health recently.

He registered at the hotel yesterday afternoon and was given a room on the fourth floor. He left the hotel in the evening and returned about 11 o'clock. He proceeded to his room as though to retire for the night. Some time between the hours of 4.30 A. M. he removed the screen room as though to retire for the night, and landed feet first, a distance of about 50 feet. Dr. Wickware of Ottawa, who was in the room below heard him fall and rushed down. In company with the night clerk, Edward Govang, he found Mr. Starr lying on the ground suffering terribly but still conscious. He was suffering from two broken legs and other injuries, which will be more fully determined on the completion of the x-ray examination.

The police were notified and Dr. J. W. Dobson was summoned. After an examination he ordered the patient removed to the City Hospital. Some time during the night Mr. Starr wrote two letters, one to his mother and the other to a friend. Some hopes for his recovery are entertained.

LIGHTNING KILLS FOUR MEN

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., June 21.—Four men were killed by lightning near here late yesterday while they were standing under a tree on the grounds of the Indiana University waterworks. A fifth man, Harry Hobbs, was shocked badly.

The four killed were Otto Hacker, 48, his brother Thomas, 52; James Holt, 27, all of Bloomington, and Kenneth Deckard, 36, of Sullivan. The men were killed during a severe storm. They had gathered under the tree to seek shelter from the rain.
