THE LADY EVELYN.—The New Glasgow News contains the following additional particulars of the floating of the S. S. Lady Evelyn which ran ashore at Pictou Island: The Lady Evelyn floated at two o'clock Thursday morning. Although several steamers were standing by she made the effort under her own power and was successful. There was an abnormally high tide running, which accounts for her getting off so easily. When she struck on the rock there was a loud report which was heard inland for a considerable distance and it was feared that the Lady Evelyn was either there to stay or that great difficulty would be experienced in clearing her. She made no water after being floated and apparently sustained no damage. A survey is to be held either this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

MATCHED BELTS.—At the last St. Louis sale a matched pair of silvers sold for \$1,500, and we learn that because of the perfect match of the two skins at least 25 per cent more was paid for them sold as such than if they had been sold singly. Matched pelts always bring a higher figure than unmatched, although the single skins are equally as valuable. The ranchers of P. E. Island have found out that they can get more money for silver pelts when they are sold in pairs as nearly alike as possible than when they sell them singly—and to get this higher figure, a rancher who has one fine pelt will often match it with one from another ranch and they are sold together. As far as it is possible ranchers should try to breed a number of foxes whose pelts are nearly alike. The amount of extra money that is paid for a matched pair, of course, depends greatly upon the quality of the pelts, a much higher proportion being paid for a choice pair of silvers than for an inferior pair. We know of one instance where a fur dealer paid \$200 for a choice exceptionally matched pair, when he would only offer \$1,300 for two silvers that were equally as good but were not matched. Our advice is, therefore, if you have a fine choice pelt, try to find some other rancher who has a like one, and sell them as a pair.—Black Fox Magazine.

LICENSED VENDOR MAY PURCHASE WHEREVER THEY CAN LEGALLY DO SO

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 14.—The government will not seek to restrict licensed vendors from purchasing liquor from any source where they legally can do so, declared Premier Foster in an official statement early this morning in which he announced that the government had refused to accept the proposal that retail liquor vendors in New Brunswick should be confined to making their purchases from the wholesalers at St. John.

Recently an announcement was made that in the new regulations in conjunction with the prohibition act submitted for the approval of the government by Rev. W. D. Wilson as chief inspector, was one which limited the retail vendors to buying from the St. John wholesale drug companies holding licenses, thus shutting out all concerns outside the province from being eligible for wholesale licenses and doing business in New Brunswick.

Wholesale liquor concerns in Montreal as soon as they learned of this attempt to eliminate them from doing business in New Brunswick at once retained legal representatives and commenced to get ready to fight the proposal in the courts if it met with the approval of the government.

Other suggestions by the chief inspector have not yet been considered by the government but will probably be taken up this afternoon or this evening. Included in the long list is said to be one which limits the quantity of extracts which can be sold to 2½ ounces per person daily.

FOUR ENGLISH BY-ELECTIONS NOW ON

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Four bye-elections are now in progress. Plymouth,

where Lady Astor pursues a lively contest polls on Saturday and the counting takes place November 28. W. T. Gay, her labor opponent, prophesies he will win with 12,000 votes against Lady Astor's ten thousand and the Liberal candidate's seven thousand. Lady Astor declares she will receive 14,000 majority. More dispassionate prophets including the Unionists estimate a heavy labor vote.

South Croydon polls Friday, counting November 27. The vacancy is created through the resignation of Ian Malcolm. The Unionist candidate is Sir Allan Smith, the Liberal Alderman Houlder. The election is phenomenally quiet.

The Thaner vacancy is caused through the death of Commodore Craig. The Unionist candidate is Hon. E. Harmsworth, son of Lord Robernere who makes a great feature of alleged waste by the Government. The Liberal candidate is Captain West. This election is also very uneventful.
