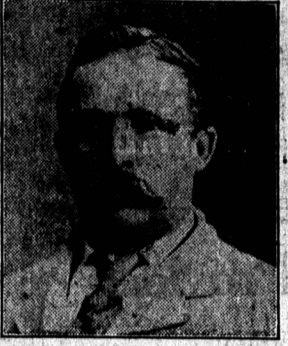

(Continued from Page 4) he was in visibly impaired health. On June 6, 1891, he died, aged 76. By common consent he had done much to shape the political history of Canada. His gifts as a leader and statesman were acknowledged not less freely by his opponents than by his supporters.

So far Mr. Low's history gives commendation to the National Policy and to Sir John Macdonald. And on page 78 we are told that on the accession of the Laurier Government to power on July 13, 1896 "it was recognized that the business of the country had adapted itself to the measure of protection and that any abrupt change would be unwise." True enough! But what happened to reverse all this, endorsement of protection between the date when the Year Book was written and the recent budget debate? This happened. The King Government in a minority after lost bye-elections, made a complete sur-

render to the Progressives as the price of the latter's support! Reduced freight rates had already been given and the completion of the Hudson Bay project and branch railroads in every Western Province promised. But more was demanded. A part of that "more" was that Premier King practically adopt the Progressive trade policy and should put on record his pledge that there would be no general election this year! That is an open secret at Ottawa. Mr. King made the required announcement during the budget debate. Positive proof of this statement may not be available but all the attendant circumstances support it. In the meantime Mr. Low's record in the Year Book had been overlooked or forgotten. Now it leaps to light to shame and confound the faithless conspirators. Out of their own mouths let them be judged!
