SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each six years from date of homestead entry.

Miss Gertrude Hamilton, B. A., daughter of Rev. C. W. Hamilton, of Salisbury, at one time stationed in this city, has accepted the position of Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Brantford, Ont., and will begin her duties September 1st.

The steamer Minto sailed from Halifax Saturday for Hudson Bay. At Sydney she will take the schooner Chrissie G. Thomey in tow.

Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, of Central Church, Hamilton, formerly of Zion Church, Charlottetown, will summer in Nova Scotia. On his way east he will preach in St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, for one Sabbath, and in August he is expected to occupy the pulpit of Fort Massey, Halifax, for two Sabbaths.

Work has begun on the foundation for the new Deer Park Church Toronto, of which Rev. B. MacLeod, formerly of Brackley Point, P. E. I., is minister. The new building will be architecturally beautiful and thoroughly modern in its adaptation to the needs of present day religious work in a city community.

By the unanimous passage of a resolution adopted at Thursday's session of the Maritime Medical Association in Halifax, the association ceases to exist after the close of the present meeting. The president, Dr. E. A. Kirkpatrick, in his report, recommended that the association be disbanded, giving sound reasons for so doing, and a committee was appointed to consider the recommendation and to report the result. The presentation of their report was the first business of this morning's session, and was favorable to disbanding, the recommendation passed being as follows: "Your committee recommend that the Maritime Medical Association cease to exist after the closing of this present meeting and that the funds on hand be divided equally between the Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Association." The action of the association grows out of the fact that practically no members save those from Nova Scotia attend the annual meetings. At the present annual meeting New Brunswick has but one representative and Prince Edward Island none. Each of the three Provinces has its own Association and it is felt that the Canadian Medical Association's existence leaves no reason of the existence of the Maritime organization.
