Georgetown District S. S. Association.

The Fourth Convention of the Georgetown District Sunday School Association, met in the Methodist Church, Union Road, King's Co. at 2.30 p. m. on Thursday, Aug. 29th. The first session was opened by the President Mr. D. Ross, the Rev. G. P. Raymond, Field Secretary, read a scripture selection and offered prayer. After the devotional exercises, the President welcomed the convention to Union Road. Schools were represented as follows:

Reports were on the whole encouraging. After roll call, Rev. N. G. Stevenson invoked the Divine Blessing in the convention and the schools represented. Mr. John Gillis then read a paper on "Sunday Schools past and present". This masterly paper was filled with interesting information and was undoubtedly the result of much thought and consideration. Before the close of the session the Rev. G. P. Raymond made some remarks on the "Force of habit", "Normal Work" and "Home Department", urging each one to do all their power to make the Sunday School as interesting as possible.

Session closed with the Benediction.

EVENING SESSION 7.30.

The evening session was opened with devotional exercises conducted by the president, Mr. N. J. McDonald and Mr. Frank Jenkins leading in prayer.

Mrs. W. H. Spencer then read a short paper on the "Teacher Teaching" emphasizing the fact that those who teach, should first possess themselves of the knowledge then impart it. The teacher should secure the love and respect of the class, and also insist on the lesson being studied at home. Questions as a whole should be put to the class, but the answer sought from one by name.

The principals of her paper, she illustrated by teaching a class which was referred to by the Field Secretary as an ideal class, and was not only interesting but helpful to all teachers present. After music by the choir Mr. James McLeod read a paper on "The Necessity of Sunday School Work and Hints to Teachers." Mr. McLeod claimed the need of S. S. Work, because on the religious training of the youth depends the future of the men, and in the religious tuition of a people depends the destiny of a nation and "on the religious training of a man depends his eternity." He also asked teachers to put their hearts into the work and to try and understand their scholars and how to deal with them.

The last item of the Session was an address by the Field Secretary, in which he referred to the study of the Word of God, and this value of the Bible, he said: "If we have purity in politics, if we have social and civic reform, we must cling to the Bible, deprived of the Bible, we would be void of all that is good in literature. If we neglect the study of God's Word we cannot become strong, Christian men and women. At the close of his address Mr. Raymond answered questions regarding S. S. work.

A vote of thanks was tendered the residents of Union Road, for their hospitality, and to the choir, and the Field Secretary for the part they took in making the convention a success. Rev. G. P. Raymond and Mr. D. Ross replied. Session closed, Mr. Raymond pronouncing the Benediction.

Financial District Meeting.

The financial meeting of the Charlottetown District was held in the Methodist Church, Highfield, on Thursday, commencing at 9.30.

The proceedings began with devotional exercises, the Rev. E. Ople presiding. The following ministerial and lay delegates were present: Revs. S. H. Rice, Thomas Hicks, H. B. Thomas, A. D. McCully, Wm. Wass, H. Pierce, F. Frizzle, Jos. Parkins, and brethren, N. Peardon, Wm. Pierce, Wm. Boyle.

The Revs. G. M. Young and J. W. McConnells were formally excused from attendance owing to absence from home not having returned from their European trip.

The meeting then proceeded to the transaction of its business. Careful inquiry was made into estimated expenditures and probable income of the different missions within the district. Winsloe, Vernon River, Montague, Souris and Mt. Stewart, were recommended to receive grants from the general Missionary Society.

Arrangements were made for a vigorous campaign this fall in aid of the Missionary and Educational Funds. The clergymen within the District are appointed to attend the sessionary meeting as follows:

The other circuits and missions will make their own plans.

The Revs. Professor Andrews of Mount Allison and R. W. Weddall, A. B., will address meetings during the month of September on educational matters. An interesting discussion took place on Sabbath School Work, in which several of the Ministers took part. The paramount importance of the training of the young people was recognized, and the District pledged itself to more earnest effort in carrying on this work.

Then followed a well sustained and highly profitable conversation on the Spiritual Work of the Church. Addresses were delivered by all the Ministers and several laymen. The Rev. G. A. Sellar of St. John, who has been laid aside for several weeks, was present at the afternoon session, and in response to the call of the Chairman, delivered a brief address. At the close a resolution was passed, recommending the faithful employment of those methods of preaching, which by the power of the Holy Ghost had proved so greatly blessed in the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

An Evangelistic meeting was held in the evening. Earnest and appropriate addresses were delivered by the Chairman, Rev. R. Ople, on "Apathy and Indifference;" the Revs. A. D. McCully, Wm. Wass and S. H. Rice, on "Practical Aspects of the Work of the Church." Appropriate hymns were rendered by the choir, assisted by the organist, Miss Pierce.

A resolution, thanking the friends of Highfield for their generous hospitality, was passed, and thus a pleasing and profitable meeting was brought to a close.
