JUDGE'S QUESTIONS CONVICTED CRIPPEN

LONDON, Oct. 24.—Nothing so strongly grips the popular imagination as one of those big murder stories which from time to time, having thus seized that imagination, pass forth into the ever lengthening list of historic crimes. Such a murder was that for which an American doctor, Hawley Harvey Crippen, was sentenced to death on Saturday afternoon by the Lord Chief Justice of England after a trial occupying four days and a half at the Old Bailey.

Crippen's air of complete indifference, combined with an entire lack of any dignity or strength, even that of a criminal; his neat, commonplace appearance, his shopwalker's smile and manner, robbed him of all popular sympathy, almost even of interest.

Lord Alverstone, Lord Chief Justice of England, is the most impressive and dignified figure on the British bench. Robed in ermine and scarlet and attended by the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs wearing their official gowns and gold chains of office, he is the personification of judicial strength, of which the black, gold-embroidered sword over a chain is the emblem. Beneath him sat the black-gowned, white-wigged clerk, and in the well of the court, between him and the great dock, where Crippen's dapper, insignificant figure was dwarfed by the burly forms of three warders, sat gowned and wigged counsel at a large table, at which the instructing solicitors, with books and papers, were seated.

Three loud knocks behind the judge's seat warned the court of his entrance. Preceded by a macebearer and accompanied by the officials already mentioned, the judge and the upstanding court exchanged bows and forthwith the trial began. The twelve men file into the jury box and are sworn in one by one to see justice "by our Sovereign Lord the King, and the prisoner." Three jurors, and this is very exceptional, are rejected

by the prisoner's counsel, and three others are brought in. Within eight minutes after the judge's entrance the jury is empaneled, the prisoner is arraigned and the clerk reads the charge to Crippen, who pleads not guilty.

"Mr. Mair," says the judge, and the leading counsel stands up and begins his statements of the Crown's case in calm, passionless language, without a gesture, without the slightest attempt at rhetoric.

Then the Crown witnesses were called in rapid succession, and in the first day, despite more than two hours' loss of time owing to a jury man fainting, between 10.30 and 4.30, fifteen witnesses had been examined and cross-examined. This quiet, rapid

business-like method of procedure was the outstanding feature of the whole trial.

Once only in the four and a half days did counsel protest at anything that had happened. This was done by counsel for the defence, who objected to the introduction of a Crown witness after the case for the crown had been closed. The judge said: "I will admit the evidence so far as it is justified by the prosecuting counsel's opening statement." Counsel for the defence remained standing a moment in further protest.

"I will take care of you, Mr. Tohin," said the judge. Counsel bowed and took his seat. The incident occupied hardly a minute.

Not a single witness was examined or cross-examined by counsel on either side without the judge's intervention, sometimes requesting counsel to make his question clearer, sometimes helping the witness to couch his answer, always making every effort to save time. It mattered nothing whether it was a Crown or defence witness, for the counsel had finished with him or her the judge would say: "Now, I want to ask a few questions." Then in three or four lucid questions he would elicit in plain, concise form what counsel would take twenty minutes and innumerable questions to do. Then the judge would ask a few questions, and then straight to the point, which counsel had overlooked or did not desire put.

When counsel for defence outlined his story of Crippen's arrangement with the quartermaster to hide him aboard the steamer Montrose, after the first sentence the judge interposed, asking: "Do you produce the quartermaster?"

"No my Lord," counsel replied. The judge nodded, and the weak story, evidently shortened, fell stillborn from counsel's lips. So it was throughout the trial, and it was the judge's questions that made Crippen contradict himself on an important question, the date of the purchases and who purchased, whether himself or his wife, the incriminating pyjamas, part of which was found with the remains.

Twice the judge intervened in behalf of Crippen, once when the prosecution was pressing him on what he meant by "It" when he said to Inspector Dew at Quebec: "It is only fair to say I told Miss LeNeve nothing about it." Crippen said he meant he had told her nothing of his series of lying letters and telegrams. The judge made counsel accept the answer, but in summing up he drew attention to the weakness of the explanation and his whole lucid retelling of the story in his summing up could not have been more damning had it come from the mouth of the prosecuting counsel. Indeed, his impressive delivery and its aloofness from all personal feeling made it far more convincing of the prisoner's guilt than the final address of the prosecution to the jury.
