EASTERN NOTES.—The weather is decidedly cooler which is generally to be expected in this latitude in the latter part of September. Stormy weather has interfered with the fishing recently, although the fishing has not amounted to much for some time from the Basin Head or west from Red Point. Want of bait has been the big trouble the greater part of the season. Not nearly the usual quantity of hake is landed on the south side this year. Some codfish will probably be caught about East Point later on, but fishermen don't reckon much on them.
