Turks Protest Against Armenian Representation

(Special to The Guardian.) LAUSANNE, Dec 26—A vigorously worded protest against the decision of the Near East Conference sub commission on minorities to permit the Armenian delegate to appear before the sub-commission, and set forth their desires, was forwarded to the conference today by the Turkish delegation.

LAUSANNE, Dec 26—The Near East conference will resume tomorrow with a good many wounds to heal. The British are plainly annoyed over the Turkish answer concerning Mosul. The Turks, insisting vigorously that Mosul belongs to Turkey, allege that the British occupied that territory after the armistice at Mudros; they say that two districts of Iraq have already been elected to join Turkey, and Mosul, whose Kurd population is more sympathetic with the Turks than the Arabs, will undoubtedly do likewise if a plebiscite is held.

The British delegate said today that they would continue to contend that Mosul belongs to Iraq and would hold until the Iraq government decides to cede it to Turkey. The Russians spent Christmas moodily at their hotel. M. Tchitcherine declared tonight that the Straits question would never be settled without Russian consent. He gave the impression that the Russian delegation would never sign any agreement implying opening of the Straits to European warships, because that would be "a knife in the side of Russia."

The entertainment was of reasonable length, the audience getting home at a good hour, all well satisfied with a most delightful performance. The orchestra is deserving of special word of praise. A Quadruple Tragedy About Christmas Tree SEATTLE, Wa., Dec 26—Appearing suddenly at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Engel, while the Engel family was gathered around a Christmas tree today, Emil Neuriter, a ferryboat operator, shot and killed Anna, Hans and Lily Engel, and then killed himself.

A half filled bottle of whiskey was found in Neuriter's pocket. He had taken three pistols to the house and two of his pockets were filled with cartridges. Mr. and Mrs. Engel and two other children escaped from the house uninjured.

Letters found in Neuriter's pocket mentioned supposed troubles with Engel but did not reveal specifically the cause of Neuriter's enmity.

Islander Rescued From Burning Hotel At Fredericton

FREDERICTON, Dec. 25.—Thomas Campbell, of Souris, P. E. Island, had to be rescued by firemen from the roof of the La Tour hotel which was badly damaged by fire early this morning.

He climbed through a window which he broke out and was taken from the roof by firemen by means of a ladder. He is reported along with others to have lost a considerable amount of money.

MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE OF MR. JOSEPH G. MCLELLAN

Missing From his Home at Indian River Since Last Friday, no Trace of Mr. McLellan has yet Been Found Despite Efforts of Search Parties. It is Feared he May Have Perished in Snow Storm.

A very distressing incident is reported from Kensington in the disappearance on Friday night of Mr. Jos. G. McLellan a respected resident of Indian River.

Friday night was very stormy and Mr. McLellan about 9 o'clock went out to put in a neighbor's horse. He returned to the house and went out again. From that time no trace of him has been found.

Search parties have gone all over the ground in the district and have failed to find any trace of his whereabouts. It is feared he may have perished in the storm, and that his body is now lying covered by snow.

The most probable theory is that Mr. McLellan may have gone towards Richmond Bay, about one quarter of a mile distant, to meet his brother who had been in Summerside, and thus became lost on the ice.

Mr. McLellan is very well known throughout the province and has a number of relatives in Indian River. The mystery of his sudden disappearance is the most baffling that has ever occurred in the vicinity.

Great sympathy is felt for the family, there being a wife and five children.

According to the latest telephone message received by The Guardian from Kensington last night, not the slightest trace of the missing man has yet been found, despite the continued efforts of organized search parties.

Two Are Killed In Lachine Collision

MONTREAL, Dec. 26—Two men were killed and three were injured in an automobile accident which occurred at 11:50 o'clock Christmas Eve in St. Joseph Street, Lachine, a suburb of Montreal, when two motor cars collided. The machine in which the victims were riding bounded against a cement and iron fence, the two occupants striking their heads against the iron railings. Death was almost instantaneous, the victims skulls being fractured.

Baby Thrown Into Mail Sack

CLEVELAND, Dec. 26—Amid the hustle and bustle of a large crowd of Christmas shoppers in the main post office today came the cries of a mother for her young infant.

While the mother was addressing Xmas packages at a table in the lobby she placed the child in a market basket which she placed under the table. Her packages really to be mailed, she looked for the baby. It had disappeared.

The basket, with its contents, had been picked up by a postoffice employee and thrown into a mail sack. Cries from the child as the sack was about to be piled on a mail truck led to its discovery.

The Weather, Etc Railway Magnates Earn Big Salaries

WASHINGTON, Dec 26—Eight railroad executives in the United States were being paid at the rate of \$75,000 a year or more as of June 30, 1921, according to reports filed by the railroads with the Senate Interstate Commerce Commission in compliance with an order of the commission in the revenues and expenses of the carriers.

Julius Kruttschnitt, Chairman of the Board of the Southern Pacific, heads the list with a salary of \$100,000. Robert S. Lovett, Chairman of the Board of the Union Pacific, formerly in the \$100,000 class, was being paid at the rate of \$75,000 a year in 1921, the report showed.

A. H. Smith, President of the New York Central, came next to Mr. Kruttschnitt, with a total representation of \$92,500, which represented his salaries from the New York Central and its subsidiaries.

Those in the \$75,000 class in addition to Mr. Lovett, followed: Carl R. Gray, President of the Union Pacific; C. H. Markman, President of the Illinois Central; E. Pennington, President of the Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie; William Sproule, President of the Southern Pacific, and Hale Holden, President of the Chicago Burlington & Quincy.

Mr. Percy Bowness led the poll and was elected with a majority of 155 having a total of 297 votes. Mr. Joseph Richard polled 142 and Mr. Harrington 5 votes.
