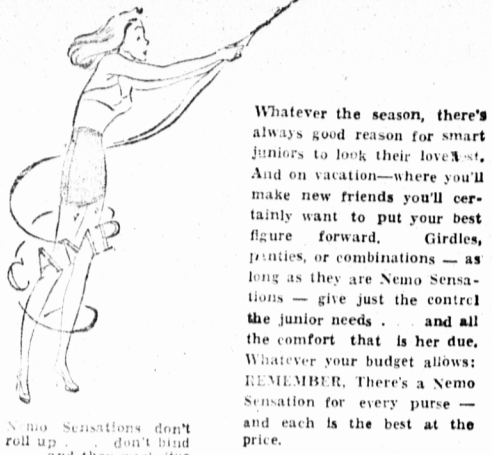

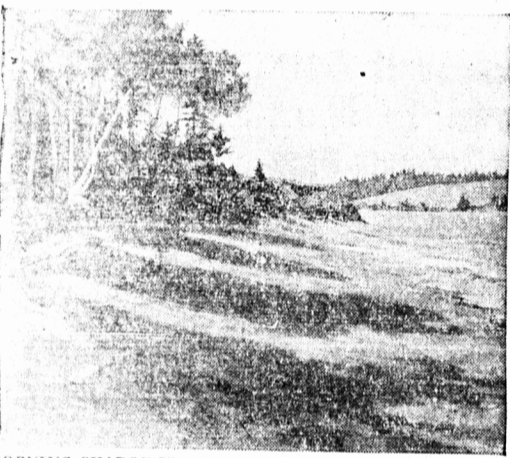

## Local Artist Represented In C. N. E. At Toronto

Visitors from this community (Prince Edward Island) to the 1940 Canadian National Exhibition, opening August 23rd, will find an exhibition there of specific local interest. A painting entitled "Morning Shadows" by Jack Taylor of Prince Edward Island recently purchased by International Business Machines Corporation will be shown with 9 other canvases from the province and from Newfoundland in the company's exhibit in the General Exhibits Building at the Exhibition. This is the canvas chosen by Mr. A. L. Wright, Art Society of Prince Edward Island, Charlottetown, as a representative painting from the Province of Prince Edward Island.

A second exhibition of contemporary paintings, chosen by art authorities in 70 different countries, and also purchased by the International Business Machines Corporation will be shown in the Gallery of Fine Art at the Exhibition. The collection especially invited by Mr. Fred S. Haines, Art Commissioner of the Canadian National Exhibition, this group of 19 paintings, each descriptive of the native country, executed by leading artists, was shown last year in the I.B.M. Gallery of Science and Art at the Golden Gate International Exposition at San Francisco. It has been invited since then to many important American Museums and Universities. This showing in the Dominion marks its first

visit outside the confines of the United States. Canada is represented in this collection by a painting entitled "Canada's Rugged Northland" by Alexander Young Jackson of Toronto. Included in the show at the Gallery of Fine Art, in addition to this guest exhibit, will be 62 paintings and miniatures by well known contemporary American artists, sent to the exhibition on the invitation extended by Mr. Haines to the following New York Galleries: Grand Central Art Galleries, MacBeth, Kraushaar and Milch. ## Scout News and Notices

A poster announcing "There Are Scouts here" and describing the headquarters location, is being used throughout the areas to which evacuees are sent in England.

The Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America are to receive the royalties from Irving Berlin's song, "God Bless America." At last accounting the amount was \$43,646.66.

The Marquis of Lintilhgow, Chief Scout for India, has been awarded the Silver Wolf, the presentation being made by the Chief Commissioner for India, Lieut.-Colonel Nawab Sir Muhammad Ahmad Sa'id Khan of Chhatari.

"Is it not significant that the Boy Scout movement has been banned in Germany and Italy? If Germany wins it would mean the end of brotherhood between man and man. We are in for a grim struggle in the next few months, or it may be years. We shall have a swift time, but let us remember that we are standing for the most noble things that have been taught on this earth." Bishop Tubbs, speaking in Chester Cathedral.

The rescue from drowning of two Swahili natives who had fallen into the harbour at Zanzibar was credited to two Boy Scouts of the Sea Zanzibar Scout Group, Labshankar Bhagwanji, 14, and Tolisad Chumalil, 15. After getting the two Swahilis ashore the Scouts successfully used artificial respiration to revive them. The Scout Gift Cross was awarded.

Boy Scouts and English archaeologists are providing an example of British imperturbability during the German blitzkrieg. In the quiet spells Southampton Scouts and members of the local archaeological society are carrying on excavation work along the remains of a Roman road in the grounds of Bitterne Manor, searching for the ancient walls, which has some domestic dwellings of ancient Clausentum. They also are excavating an old Norman wing of the Manor House.

Wolf Cubs of Bradford, Yorkshire, have presented the Bradford Royal Infirmary with an automatic steam still, for providing distilled water.

A clergyman Scoutmaster, Rev. David Easton, was credited with leading in the safe escape from France of six Church of Scotland ministers in charge of Church Huts near Amiens, following the French collapse. The party set out in a motor car, but their huts were blown up and the Scoutmaster's knowledge of roads and maps enabled them to avoid the main highways thronged with refugees, and reach the coast in time to escape.

The goodwill of the Scouting brotherhood, even where German enemies are concerned, was demonstrated by an English Cubmaster of a southern coastal town who saw a large bomber plunge into the sea. With assistance he captured several members of the crew as they reached shore in their rubber boat. The Cubmaster, who was able to speak German, was told that the pilot of the aircraft was cautioning in his parachute gear under the tail of the plane. Unable to swim, the crew had been forced to land on a small island. The Cubmaster immediately went out to the bomber, dived under the tail, and freed the pilot. The man died, however, before he reached shore.

A two weeks' fishing trip to the Grand Banks of Newfoundland was the dream-come-true first prize of a fishing contest of New York City Boy Scouts, held under the auspices of the Fishery Council. Two thousand Scouts from 125 troops competed in the preliminary trials, and five entered the final trial. The winner was Walter Tall Roudner, and the young Scout chefs used their own cooking utensils, accepting from the hotel only the cooking gas of New York City.
