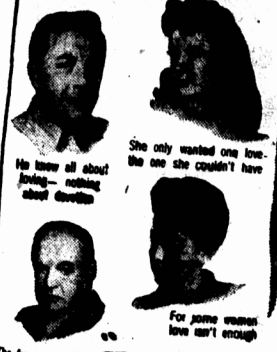

YANKS MAY LOSE POTENTIAL PREXY

SYDNEY, Australia, May 6 (CP)—Because he thinks that his unborn son may be a future president of the United States, an American naval storekeeper in Baltimore is trying to get his Sydney wife on to American soil before the baby is born in June.

Under the American constitution only natural-born citizens are eligible for the presidency. The father who has such high hopes for his son is Theo. Clem, Mrs. Clem who lives here doesn't expect to get passage before September. Clem is the representative of a Sydney paper that he was confident the baby would be a boy.

"The question is important, because thousands of other war brides and fathers with progeny pending are in the same position, though they may not realize it," he said. "Unless something is done fast the U.S. will lose out on some fine raw material for the White House."

Town Planning Committee Meets At Georgetown

The Georgetown Town Planning Committee held a meeting in the Council Chambers on Thursday, May 2nd. Mayor P. L. Boudreau presided and various subjects were discussed.

The meeting heard an interesting talk by Mr. E.B. McLaren on the history of the Kings County Exhibition. Mr. McPhes has been secretary of that organization since 1926 and under him the fair grew and prospered. He related how in 1940 the directors of the Kings County Exhibition showed patriotism in their decision to forego the Government grant, while the war was on, if other centers holding fairs would do likewise. As it developed other centers did for one year but then they again claimed their grant and once again commenced holding annual shows.

Seeing this, Mr. McLaren for four successive years tried to have the annual grant made available to the Georgetown show, but with no success, with the result that in 1944, the directors decided that the stalls and sheds on the Exhibition Grounds here had deteriorated to such an extent that they had to be torn down. In reality, as matters now stand, the Government owes the Kings County Exhibition Association \$5,000, as six years have passed since a fair has been held and the speaker stated that if this amount which the directors in 1940 were patriotic enough to forego, with the understanding that it would be used by the Government for worthwhile works, has been put to any such purpose, people in this section of the Province have not benefitted from it, as they naturally should have.

The meeting fully discussed the question of highways work, especially the highway from Poole's Garage to Georgetown and it was agreed that a six-man delegation to wait on the executive of the Government and present a brief in connection with this matter. The delegation appointed were: F. J. Solomon, Gordon Ross, Joseph Johnston, Earl McLaren, J. Macdonald Lavers and Howard McLean.

The committee meeting then adjourned to meet again on Tuesday, May 7th, in the Council Chambers. (Patriot Please Copy)

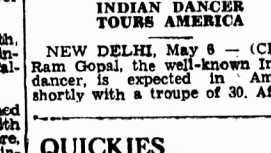
INDIAN DANCER TOURS AMERICA

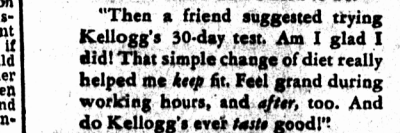

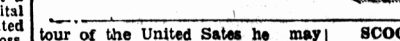
