IN MEMORIAM

MRS. LEVI LAIRD

In the death of Mrs. Levi Laird the community of North Rustico lost one of its best known citizens. After a lingering illness that seemed fatal from the first, death came on the evening of August 7th. She had borne her illness with Christian serenity and although often much distressed, she never complained and was appreciative of the slightest acts of kindness from all her friends and neighbours.

The friendship of the community was extended to her in unstinted measure and was in part an appreciation of what she herself had been in the community when in the days of health and strength she was always ready to serve, counting it a privilege to sit up with a sick neighbour or to give a helping hand in any trouble. She will be long remembered as one of the Mothers of Israel.

She leaves to mourn her husband with whom she celebrated their golden wedding last November, and together over the long span of life the happy couple, both quiet and unassuming, have lived in our midst retaining the respect of a large

circle of friends; a daughter, Mary Etta, who gave to her mother and life-long companion the love that had its origin in the heart of God. The funeral service was from the house to the Cavendish United Church and was conducted by her pastor Rev. W.A. Patterson. The service was unique in its circumstance, and unique in the experience of the people, as the two funeral services, Mrs. Levi Laird and Mrs. William Campbell, were combined in one service. The text selected was from II Tim. 1:10 "Our Saviour Jesus Christ Who Abolished Death and Brought Life and Immortality to Light".

The large audience witnessed to the esteem in which they were held in life. Interment took place in the Cavendish cemetery.

Expresses Belief War Can Be Averted

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Aug. 23.—War can and will be averted, was the belief expressed today by Dr. H. A. Bruce, Ontario Lieutenant-Governor, as he officially opened the Canadian National Exhibition. "The people of England deeply dread war and above all other things want peace," said Dr. Bruce. While in England recently, the Lieutenant Governor said he saw the King review the army, navy and air force, which in no sense were war-like gestures.

It was of great importance in these troubled times that the exhibition "helps to create in the minds of our people an international understanding and habit of thought. The world is, after all, becoming little more than a neighborhood."

JAPS DETAIN U.S. FREIGHTER IN SPY SCARE

Youths Alleged To Have Taken Photographs Of Fortified Areas.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TOKYO, Aug. 24.—Japanese authorities, ever nervous of espionage, detained an American freighter tonight and sought two United States youths said by police to have taken photographs of a fortified zone from the ship.

After naval planes joined in a wide hunt for a "mysterious foreign vessel," she was detained by gendarmes at Port Tokyama in Yamaguchi prefecture. The ship was the S. S. Golden Mountain, out of San Francisco. Her officers and crew were said to be undergoing a rigid examination at the hands of military authorities.

Police attempted to trace two young Americans they suspected of having taken photographs of the fortified zone from the freighter and then having left the ship at Tokyama and started for Kobe by train.

Their names, possibly garbled in dispatches, were given as Phillip Maas, a graduate of Stanford University, and William Felix. They were reported to be returning to the United States from Lingnan University, Canton, China. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Detention of the American-Hawaiian freighter Golden Mountain by Japanese authorities was ascribed by Thomas G. Plant, an official of the line, here today to "hyper-suspicion."

Every time a foreign vessel departs the "beaten path of commerce" in Japan, they said, authorities there envisage espionage. Especially is this so when sailors or passengers take photographs in the course of their sightseeing.

The Golden Mountain was en route to Port Tokyama to unload a cargo of salt.

Nazis Penal System Is Criticized

By Louis F. Lochner, Associated Press Foreign Staff (By Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Aug. 23.—French and Spanish delegates to the International Penal Conference criticized by implication today the Nazi system of concentration camps.

Jerome Ferrucci, Paris attorney, told a sub-committee on administration that prisoners in concentration camps, like all other prisoners, should be granted ameliorations in execution of their penalties and "the idea of vengeance must disappear from every form of justice, else there shall be a return to barbarism."

Spain's delegate, Ortega Y. Gasquet, expressed agreement with Ferrucci's views. Kurt Waldmann, director of the scientific department of Nazi attorneys, defended the German viewpoint and the severity of sentences. The conference heard Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi Minister of Propaganda, extoll the Hitler regime as "genuine democracy." He defended concentration camps and claimed national socialism had saved Europe from Communism.

Fire Sweeping Quebec Paper Mills Buildings

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICOUTIMI, Que., Aug. 23.—Three buildings of the Quebec Pulp and Paper Company here were burning fiercely tonight and two other buildings were threatened by flames as firemen were handicapped in their fight by low water pressure.

With only one pump in operation, flames were blazing in No. 1 mill and No. 3 mill of the company and an outbuilding used to peel bark from logwood. The fire also threatened mill No. 2 and the machine shop with firefighters at a loss to check the progress of the flames and the fire completely out of control. Firemen stated the buildings would burn all night.

Starting from an unknown cause at 9.30 p. m., flames quickly spread through the two mills and the outbuilding as volunteers
