The annual business meeting of St. James' congregation was held last night for the reception of reports of all the societies under the control of the session. The Trustees submitted their report with receipts, expenditures and estimates, all of which were adopted. J. E. Auld, J. A. S. Bayer and Mrs. Blanchard and Goodwill were the lecturers. Votes of thanks were tendered the Ladies Aid Society and Choir. The ordinary financial report is the best in the history of the congregation. The receipts for the year were \$4,128.03 and the expenditure was \$4,126.21, leaving a balance of \$1.82. The receipts were \$2,465.55 from open collections, while the Ladies Aid Society contributed \$1,662.58.

The annual business meeting of St. Paul's congregation was held in the school-room last evening, there being good attendance. The different reports read were highly satisfactory, and the congregation was never in better condition financially. In this respect the financial report shows the following accomplishments: Paid out for all purposes in the year months—\$4,793.48, debt of \$573 out of \$1,000, reduced to \$38; renovated and reinstalled pipe organ and paid expenses thereby incurred (totalled for missions in 9 months) \$75; spent on capital account, \$500; the matter of Duplex envelopes was discussed and votes of thanks were tendered to the officers: Much satisfaction was expressed over the financial standing of the congregation. The vestry clerk, Major C. Leigh was re-elected rector's warden. The vestry men are H. P. Pethick, H. J. Campbell, Capt. Kemp, John E. Bell, W. L. Clarke, and W. S. Louson. George Bellis was re-elected Vestry Clerk.

CANADIAN FORESTRY ASSOCIATION COVENTION

OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—The thirtieth annual convention of the Canadian Forestry Association will be held in Ottawa, February 7 and 8. The gathering will be under the auspices of H. R. H. the Governor General, and will be in the committee room of the Parliament buildings.

The convention will be opened at 10 a. m., Wednesday, Feb. 7th. Among those who are expected to be present and to take part are Hon. Borden, Premier of Canada; Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of the Interior; Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture; Mr. Gifford Pinchock of Washington, D. C.; Henry S. Graves, U. S. Forester, Washington; Hon. W. R. Ross, Minister of Lands of British Columbia; R. H. Campbell, Director of Forestry, Ottawa; Dr. E. E. Fernow, Dean of the Faculty of Forestry of the University of Toronto; and E. A. Sterling, Forestry, Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

There will be a banquet for those who attend the convention Wednesday evening, which will be participated in by the members of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, as well as the members of the Canadian Forestry Association and the friends of both.

The Canadian Forestry Association was founded in the year 1900 for the purpose of arousing public opinion to the need of forest conservation. It has had a leading share in bringing about the present attitude on this subject and its members intend to prosecute this work until the lands of Canada are examined and classified and the absolute forest lands are permanently reserved for timber production.

CHICAGO, January 12.—Ground glass in the make-up of costumes for women has run its course, according to an edict of delegates attending the Style Congress here. The women's tailors have declared for a standard of silk and say they will no longer accept that which is stiffened by ground glass to give it a "body."

The tailors also condemned the tube and hobble skirts.

NOTTING A HOLY WAR IN PERSIA.

TEHRAN, Jan. 13.—W. Morgan Shuster, the American who was recently removed from the office of treasurer-general of Persia, left here today for Europe. He was accompanied by his family and Edward Bell, secretary of the American legation at Tehran, and will proceed by way of Constantinople. It is understood that the commissioner appointed to take over the duties of the treasurer relationship, composed of four members, has resigned. Mr. Morgan, the Belgian ex-director of Persian customs, it is now understood, will assume control of the department. It is reported that the Chief Mollah, at Isfahan, is inciting the people to a holy war.

BRYAN OPPOSES BOTH HARMON AND HEARST.

NEW YORK, January 12.—Wm. J. Bryan has given the Democrats to understand that he will not consent to have either Harmon, of Ohio, or Hearst, of California, on the National Democratic ticket. Harmon and Hearst are absolutely on the black list.

Mr. Bryan did not say this yesterday in any specific statement, but no doubt he is ready to do so when the time comes. He will oppose any consideration of these men by the progressive members of the organization.

Hearst regards as an opportunist pure and simple, and a man without a party, except as exigencies arrive. Harmon is, in his opinion, the representative of everything the National Democratic party is opposed to both in and out of Congress.

JURORS HEAR EVIDENCE

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 12.—Descriptions of how Orrie McManigal, with a suit case filled with explosives and fuses, sneaked about the streets of Pittsburg, (Pa.), and Buffalo, (N. Y.), and met men who discussed or jacked out "open shop" jobs that were to be blown up, together with photographs of wrecked places forwarded to John J. McNamara, were presented before the federal grand jury in its investigation of the dynamite conspiracy.

Several witnesses from Buffalo and Pittsburg, whose names were withheld, were questioned in an effort to discover who was involved with McManigal in explosions there. The confessed dynamiter made three visits to Buffalo, the first in July, 1908, when he blew up a bridge. It developed that McNamara, a secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, obtained whenever possible, photographs of structures which McManigal blew up in order to see a check on the dynamiter in saying his "fuses" out of the \$1,000 month allowed McNamara for "organizing purposes." Many of these photographs are in the hands of the government.

Just before he went to Buffalo, McManigal assassinated the quiet dynamiting business, but he was visited at his home in Chicago by a man whose name has not yet been publicly connected with the conspiracy, but who is known to the government.

"This man told me I did not care to quit, because, on the account of my old job, I had to stick to it," said McManigal. "I told me I had gone to Canada, and I would have to stick to it. Finally we both went to Buffalo. The man with me said he wanted to get to Canada, for the explosion I took the dynamite out of my suitcase and planted it with a sixty-foot fuse. It blew up that night."

The witnesses from Pittsburg are believed to have been asked about the explosion at McKeen's locks (Pa.), which is within reach of Rochester, (Pa.), where the dynamiters kept stores of explosives.

INSURRECTION ON ISLAND OF CRETE.

LONDON, January 13.—A despatch to the London Times from Crete states that the supporters of Premier Venizelos of Greece and all the Christians have joined the insurrectionary movement, and that the executive of the island of Crete, has been converted in the cause.

An insurrectionary committee governs the island, and is preparing to end the next session of the Greek parliament on Athens. A short time ago serious trouble was caused by the return, who in their desire for union with Greece, elected Venizelos to the Greek parliament. The deputies started for Athens, but severe measures were taken to keep them out of Greece. About the same time, a revolutionary party made its appearance in Crete, and according to the despatch, apparently has the government under its complete control.

AN ENRAGED SUITOR.

NEW BEDFORD, Jan. 13.—Enraged because the young woman failed to return his affections, Andrew Twarog, 5 Fulton court attempted to take the life of Miss Katherine Proctor of 42 Washburn St., early in the morning of Jan. 12, by shooting her at her twice with a revolver, and then, believing that he had accomplished his purpose, turned the weapon to his temple and fired two more shots.

Twarog died at the Emergency Hospital. The young woman was injured, although one of the bullets tore through her shirtwaist, narrowly missing her mark.

The police investigated the case and learned that up to a short time ago the couple were sweethearts. Miss Proctor finally tired of the courtship and informed the young man that she did not want to have anything further to do with him.

At 5.45 o'clock the disappointed suitor met the young woman, in company with another woman, on Ticks street. Twarog walked up to her, pulled the revolver from his pocket and fired two shots.

Both shots hit her, the first at the temple and the second in the brain, and although he was rushed to the hospital immediately, the physician was unable to save his life. Both the young man and his sweetheart were weavers in a North End mill.

TORONTO, Can., Jan. 12.—While being carried from the police ambulance to the entrance of St. Michael's hospital today Mrs. LePovich, a Polish Jewess, gave birth to a healthy baby girl.

ITALIAN CARDINALS FEAR FOR CONTROL.

MILAN, January 12.—A despatch printed today by the "Corriere della Sera" from its Vatican correspondent, declares that the Italian Cardinals have petitioned Pope Pius to appoint a legate in order to give them a majority and prevent the election of a foreigner to the Papacy.

According to this despatch, the Roman prelates fear that two more Americans may be elevated as the Plaster Consistory. In that event the belief is it is entirely possible that a foreigner may succeed Pope Pius.

PHILIPPINE WAR OVER.

MAMILA, Jan. 12.—Twenty six Moros, were killed while they were attempting to ambush a body of United States troops on the island of Jolo. In the course of the fighting Lieutenant McGee of 2nd Cavalry was shot twice and one American soldier was wounded. Brigadier General Parshing, commander of the Department of Mindanao in the course of conversation declared that he believed this fight would mark the end of the armed opposition of the Moros to American rule in the island of Jolo and more especially so in regard to the resistance against the order for general disarmament of the Moros. The hands of Moros lay in ambush for the troops on this occasion comprised he said the last of the remaining malcontents.

BRAZIL FACES A SERIOUS SITUATION.

RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, January 12.—The situation in the state of Bahia has become very serious. The Federal government yesterday despatched a warship to the city of Bahia, where fighting was reported to have taken place. Business is at a standstill, and the people fear further disorders. The Governor of the State of Bahia today resigned his functions, which have been assumed by the president of the Court of Appeals.
