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## BETTER UNDERSTANDING WITH FRANCE

### ACTION OF LIEUT. GOVERNOR IN VETOING PROVINCIAL LEGISLATION ON UNION BILL

#### Different Interpretations Concerning Recent Conference Cleared Up.

Discussed in Ottawa House—Matter Was Referred To Department of Justice Which Has Tabled its Report

(British United Press) LONDON, June 27.—Different interpretations by French and British newspapers on the results of the conversations which took place last Sunday between Premier MacDonald and Herriot have been cleared up and it is believed that the removal of misunderstandings will lead to better understanding of the French and British differences.

Premier MacDonald's absolute denial of the existence of any "pact" has relieved British anxiety which was caused by the growing suspicions of the French militaristic party. The country is fully behind the Premier's determination to pursue a policy of forced general disarmament. Greatest satisfaction is expressed over the decision of United States to take part in the conference. There is a growing belief also that the Dominions should be represented although not formally as members of the conference. The possibility that the Dominions may be invited to send "observers" is being widely canvassed.

### JAPAN MUST TRADE WITH UNITED STATES OR DIE

#### Present Friction Will Not Change Commercial Relations, Despite Sentiment, Says Oriental Expert.

(United Press) LONDON, June 27.—Japan's resentment of the exclusion feature of the United States immigration bill will not affect, materially, the trade relations between Japan and the United States.

Japan cannot continue to be a first-class power unless she buys raw cotton from the United States, and sells raw silk to the United States.

Japan intends to continue to be a first-class power, virtually in undiminished volume, her business with the United States.

These are the only conclusions to be reached from cold-blooded analysis of the trade statistics and fundamental economic factors upon which Japan's commercial structure is based.

Sentiment, personal predilection, individual likes or dislikes, politics, have nothing to do with the matter. It is just an open and shut case of translating into everyday talk the hardest, most un sentimental things on earth—trade statistics. Figures, as the old adage has it, don't lie. And figures show just one thing—that Japan would be a complete flop, an absolute dud, if she ceased to buy from and sell to the United States. If there is anything that the Japanese intend positively not to be it is to be a complete flop or an absolute dud. So they will continue to do business with Uncle Sam's country.

The basic facts are:

- Two-thirds of Japan's exports are raw silk and manufactured cotton cloth. The raw silk is sold to the United States. The raw cotton is bought from the United States.

### GERMANY MAY SOON ENTER THE LEAGUE

(British United Press) BERLIN, June 27.—Germany intends to apply for membership in the League of Nations at the League Assembly at Geneva next September, according to information from a reliable source.

The news follows the announcement of plans for an inter-Allied reparations conference fostered by Britain and France, the governments of which are both inclined toward increased League activity in European affairs.

Britain and other Powers, recently have urged that Germany apply for league membership, but relinquish her former demand for immediate permanent membership in the League Council.

It is understood that Germany is convinced that once the Experts' scheme is in operation her importance as a world power will assure her admission to the League.

Pro League sentiment has been increasing here for some time. League advocates began an active propaganda in the summer of 1923, and since have pushed their cause aggressively.

### KELLOGG WILL REPRESENT THE UNITED STATES

#### Ambassador to London Will be Official Observer at Premiers' Conference.

(British United Press) WASHINGTON, June 27.—American Ambassador Kellogg to London has been instructed by President Coolidge to act as American observer at the London conference of Premiers on July 15.

Col. K. Ames Logan, American observer on the Reparations Commission, was ordered to assist Kellogg.

Announcing these instructions, the White House, in a formal statement, said: "It is the desire of the administration that the Dawes plan should be put into effect as speedily as possible, and Kellogg was directed to attend the conference for the purpose of dealing with such matters as affect the interests of the United States and otherwise for purposes of information."

The White House statement follows: "It is the desire of the administration that the Dawes plan should be put into effect as speedily as possible. This is the first essential step to the economic recovery abroad in which the country is vitally interested. It is with this view that, in response to the invitation extended by Prime Minister MacDonald, instructions have now been given to Ambassador Kellogg to attend the conference in London on July 15th, for the purpose of dealing with such matters as affect the interests of the United States and otherwise for the purpose of information."

"Col. Logan will go to London to assist the Ambassador."

### HEMATITE DISCOVERED NEAR MICHIGIPOTEN

(Canadian Press) SAULTE ST. MARIE, Ont., June 27.—A very interesting discovery of hematite ore has been made by Isaac and Joseph Ball, about six miles south of the Michipicoten River. Specimens of the ore show it to be a high grade ore of good quality. The range is about two miles in length, and from 100 to 200 feet in width. Light claims have been staked and recorded already.

### ST. JOHN MAN IS REPORTED KILLED IN CALIFORNIA

(Canadian Press) AMHERST, June 27.—Mrs. E. A. Carr, daughter of A. D. Walker, received word last night that her husband had been killed in an automobile accident in Los Angeles, on Tuesday night. No particulars were given as to the nature of the accident. Mr. Carr has been in Los Angeles since last year and it was the intention of Mrs. Carr and the daughter to join him there this summer. He was about 55 years of age and a native of St. John.

### STOLEN CAR FOUND NEAR WOODSTOCK

WOODSTOCK, June 27.—A message to Sheriff Foster this morning from Bangor, Maine, requested him to be on the lookout for a large Nash sedan, H. 1-628, stolen from Edward Kane. The sheriff learned that a large car had been in Hartland during the day, with a young man accompanied by a girl. He trailed the pair and found them at Muniac. He stepped into the car and ordered the man to drive to Woodstock, arriving this evening.

The man, who is 23 years of age, gave his name as Norris Brooks, of Bangor, and the girl, who is 17, Ethel M. Burnham, of Bucksport, Maine.

Norris says he met the girl yesterday at the circus in Bangor. He is said they admit having stolen the car, and are ready to return to Bangor.

(Canadian Press) LEINGRAD, June 27.—Floods in Lake Ladoga region have engulfed 61 villages. The water rose 14 feet, causing an enormous damage. Many lives are reported to have been lost and many are homeless.

### BRITAIN PLANS TO HOLD SUDAN

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 27.—The British Government announced today that it is not going to abandon the Sudan in any sense whatever. This definite endorsement of the policy of the previous Government was proclaimed by Lord Parmoor, Lord President of the Council, in the House of Lords, and carries greater significance in view of the impending visit to the Egyptian Premier, Zoghlou, to confer with the British Government on outstanding questions and to discuss the Egyptian demand for cessation of the Sudan.

### BOY FOUND STARVING IN OTTAWA PARK

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 27.—Walter Burgess, aged 14, of Toronto, was found unconscious in one of the city parks late yesterday. He was so weak from starvation that he could not answer questions. He was taken to a local hospital.
