

TORONTO MAPLE LEAFS ENTER CUP FINALS

Metz Scores With Six Seconds Remaining To Beat N. Y. Rangers 3-2

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, Toronto, March 31—(CP)—Nick Metz sent Toronto Maple Leafs into the Stanley Cup finals when he scored a story-book goal with only six seconds of play remaining to down New York Rangers 3-2 here tonight. The Leafs now meet Detroit Red Wings for hockey's world title.

Metz broke up the sixth game of a best-of-seven semi-final cup series when he caught the Rangers down the ice to break fast down the left side. He circled Bill Juzda, the only defenceman in his path and belted a hard drive past Sugar Jim Henry, rookie New York goalie. Syl Apps started the play.

A crowd of 13,875 fans saw the Leafs go in front in the 12th minute of the first period on one of the flukes; goals scored here this season. Johnny McCreey drifted a low shot from 70 feet out. Henry did not appear to notice the shot until it was on top of him and the puck skidded into the net off his foot as he moved to the outside of the goal crease.

The second period was only 49 seconds old when Pete Langelle speared a loose puck in centre ice and raced toward the New York net with Pratt chasing him. Langelle fired a waist-high shot that beat Henry cleanly.

The Rangers appeared to be a badly beaten club but they suddenly started to click midway through the final period. Bryan Hexall laced a pass across the Toronto net on a power play behind the Toronto blue line and Phil Watson flipped the puck past goalie Turk Broda.

Inspired by the goal the Rangers commanded the play and less than two minutes later Alfie Pike knotted the count on a shot from well-out. They kept pressing and had four men on the attack when Metz broke for the deciding tally. The Rangers finished the con-

test with only 13 players. Patrick was boarded late in the first period and suffered a torn ligament in his right knee and was forced to the sidelines except for a brief turn in the second period. Grant Warwick suffered a twisted left knee late in the contest; and also retired to the dressing room. Lorne Carr was the only Toronto casualty, suffering a sprained right wrist.

Wings Enter Finals By Defeating Boston 3-1 In Second Game Of Series

DETROIT, March 31—(CP)—The Detroit Red Wings entered the finals of the Stanley Cup playoffs tonight with a 3-1 victory over the defending champion Boston Bruins in the second game of the best-of-three semi-finals series before 13,525, largest crowd ever to see a game here.

The Red Wings, last year's Cup finalists also, will meet the Toronto Maple Leafs, winner in the deciding game against the New York Rangers, in a best-of-seven series for the battered trophy.

The heroes were 23-year-old Jack Carveth, playing his first year of big league hockey, and veteran Don Grosso, Carveth, paying on a "kid" line, scored the first two of Detroit's goals. Grosso unloosed a howling shot when, with goalie Frankie Brimsek off the ice in the last minute of play as Boston, with six forwards, tried to tie the count. He made a 160-foot bulge eye.

Carveth sent the Red Wings into the lead in the first four minutes of play. He grabbed the puck from centre Art Jackson and got off a pass intended for Jerry Brown in front of the Boston net. It never reached Brown, however, striking Jack Crawford's leg and bouncing high past Brimsek.

Boston, unable to match Detroit's offensive tonight, evened the count midway in the period on a goal by Herbie Cain. All Cain had to do after Harvey and Art Jackson had worked the puck from behind the net was to jam it past goalie Johnnie Mowers' leg when the latter tried to cover up an opening. Then, at 9:46 of the third period, Carveth got the second of his tallies after a face-off deep in Boston territory. Jerry Brown passed to Adam Brown and, in a scramble, the latter shoved the puck toward the goal. Carveth came out nowhere to beat Brimsek with a whistling shot.

It was all Detroit after that, but the Red light flared again, six seconds before the game ended when Brimsek was taken out and six forwards placed on the ice. At that time centre Don Grosso grabbed the disc in his own territory as the Bruins charged in, got over his own blue line, and sent a shot down the ice toward the unprotected goal. The 160-foot drive found its mark and it was all over.
