RADIO COM. CONCLUDES HEARINGS

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

OTTAWA, April 9.—Unless instructed by the House of Commons to reopen the whole question of national broadcasting as a policy, the committee on radio decided today to reaffirm its decision not to hear witnesses other than officials of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, and concluded its public hearings.

As protest against this decision, which was reached originally yesterday, J. Earl Lawson (Con. York South) declared he would have nothing to do with the report the committee will make to parliament.

A. M. Edwards (Con. Waterloo South) also said he would not sign a unanimous report.

Mr. Lawson and Mr. Edwards said they had no charges to make or substantiate against the Corporation and were heartily in support of national broadcasting control, but felt the private interests who competed with the corporation should be heard.

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Plan Linking Up Of Five Countries

PARIS, April 6.—A plan for an alliance linking Soviet Russia, Poland, Rumania and Yugoslavia with France for defence of Czechoslovakia against possible attack from Nazi Germany was presented today by Foreign Minister Joseph Paul-Boncour.

The proposal was outlined to the French Ambassadors to Moscow and Warsaw and the ministers to Prague and Bucharest who were summoned to Paris after Germany annexed Austria.

The diplomats were instructed to sound the Governments to which they are accredited regarding such a line-up. Similar instructions were sent the French Minister to Yugoslavia.

Each was told to ask the four powers to state their exact position in case Czechoslovakia, half-surrounded by Germany, is the victim of Nazi aggression.

Officials declared the keystone to the problem was Poland, strategically situated between Germany and Russia and with strong military forces.

Leon Noel, French Ambassador to Warsaw, was told by Paul-Boncour to tell Poland that France must know, once and for all, whether Poland is ready to march with her in case she attacks Germany to aid the Czechs.

France's aim is to ask the four powers to "harmonize" their general policies with those of France in order to form a united wall of resistance against aggression in central and eastern Europe.

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That Body of Yours

BAD BREATH AND ITS CAUSES

Advertising copy writers tell us that one of the biggest, if not the biggest, advertising appeals is that of fear—fear of heart disease, cancer, or other diseases, endangering health and life. Another fear is that of being disliked by other people. It is this fear that causes so many to buy throat gargles, tooth washes, and laxatives because their breath may be offensive without their knowledge.

Now there is nothing wrong with taking any or all of these precautions against bad breath—halitosis—because they do give some temporary relief until the cause of bad breath is found the taking of these precautions is justified.

However, while some of the causes of bad breath are of a simple nature and not likely to do much if any harm to the system, there are some causes that damage the body, yet the individual, because he is using mouth washes, gargles, and tooth pastes, knows "nothing" any odor, neglects to have the conditions corrected.

Physicians and dentists tell us that the most frequent cause of bad breath is due to decayed teeth. There may be cavities or there may be little portions of food left on the teeth that should be removed by brushing the teeth or rinsing out the mouth after each tooth pick. Sometimes the dead tooth pick and the more efficient dental floss becomes necessary to remove the tiny pieces of food that get lodged between the teeth.

"All cavities should be filled, tartar deposits should be regularly removed, not only because of their tendency to cause disagreeable odor but because organisms may develop and be allowed to multiply in the cavities. If any burning or soreness is present alkaline mouth washes should be used.

I have spoken before of the terrible breath often due to the dry film of catarrh and the difficulty of correcting it; also of the bad breath due to infected tonsils. Bad breath from stomach troubles is a problem of considerable importance—is not uncommon.

However, medical students are taught to look for the commonest of symptoms "first." As the commonest cause of bad breath have to do with the teeth regular visits to your dentist should be good insurance against bad breath.

BEDROOM LIGHTING FACTOR IN REST
Have your dressing tables adequately mirrored and well lighted. Don't put a dinky mirror on a dressing table just because you have it or because it is "attractive." And don't use too small or too short lamps on the dressing table. Instead use a mirror of adequate size, and have the light preferably above the mirror, and directed down on the user.

If you are building a house try to persuade the architect to design the bedrooms so that the beds will not have to be placed where they face the glaring morning light. If your house is built and this difficult presents itself, try to overcome it by using Venetian blinds or blinds of similar nature, or by opaque window shades. Or buy night eye-shades!

SHOREHAM, England, April 8.—Earl Winterton today stated that neither the British nor the Dominion Government were prepared to stand for a policy of peace at any price, or they would not be re-arming.

The Cabinet Minister—Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster—in a speech to his Sussex constituents here, strongly attacked David Lloyd George, the Great War Prime Minister, saying that a terrible thing that such a man of genius should be trusted by his fellow men.

Earl Winterton warned France to beware of one who for more than a decade has been a bitter and not too scrupulous critic of their party and our Government's.

He contended that proposals by the Labor and Liberal Opposition parties for an alliance of Great Britain, France and Russia against the Fascist powers would be a certain prelude to eventual war on an all-European scale.

Not Pleased With Budget
He confessed that he was "not any too pleased" with last year's deficit, and to learn that we are facing another unbalanced budget that we didn't expect, and I think the situation has been dealt with as capably as could be done by any body of men that ever sat under the roof of this Legislature.

He cited the demands owing to the unexpected seed grain shortage, agricultural machinery, and other things today we could cut our estimates on agriculture in two, but as conditions are, we must do something to help the farmer. It will take about \$80,000, or something like that, to supply seed oats.

"In education we are paying \$16,000 to the Library, but it was foisted on this Province by the Carnegie people," Mr. MacKinnon said.

Old age pensions, relief and other uncontrolled expenditures were cited. Apart from these items the Government, he thought, had "paired things to the bone."

He was surprised, Mr. MacKinnon said, that those educated gentlemen who were clamoring for elimination of Latin from the school curriculum, could only express themselves through a barrage of "educated" words. Latin he conceded might be made optional but it should not be eliminated altogether.

The House adjourned until 3 p.m. today (Monday).

Canada At War

THE great battles of March, 1918, which, in their last desperate efforts to wrest victory from defeat, saw the German hordes hammering at the gates of Amiens and extending their operations north of Compiègne, found the Canadian corps early in April sections entrenched in front of Vimy Ridge.

Sir Douglas Haig had been forced to withdraw troops from his northern front to stem the German advance in the south; and in consequence the sector allotted to the Canadians was greatly extended. The four divisions were sprayed across the front from the neighborhood of Neville Vitasse, southeast of Arras, northward across the Scarpe River, along the whole eastern face of Vimy Ridge on the plain of Douai. Continuing they encircled Lens and ended at Hill 70, just south of the La Bassée Canal.

The corps thus held approximately 30 miles of front, nearly one-quarter of the whole British line. But, in spite of the struggles in progress all around them, they were left in peace. It was they who had captured the Ridge on April 9, 1917; and they had held it in undisputed possession for the past year. They had constructed powerful defence works; and they were determined the Germans would never recapture it.

Their knowledge of the determination would seem to have penetrated to the German, for although Vimy Ridge was the keystone of their position, 10 German divisions, their capture would have spelled definite triumph of all their efforts, they made no attempt whatever to engage the Canadians.

By the first anniversary of the storming of Vimy Ridge saw the 1918 battles enter the most critical phase of the whole war. On the morning of April 9, 1918, the enemy launched their overwhelming attack from the La Bassée Canal to Armentières. On a front of 15 miles 10 German divisions attacked two British and one Portuguese division. Seven of the 10 enveloped four Portuguese brigades.

German victory was immediate. Within a short while the Portuguese had been completely destroyed. The 40th and 55th British divisions strove to withstand the onslaught. The 50th and 51st British divisions, already weakened by terrific casualties elsewhere, attempted to hold the line. At the end of the day the enemy were on the outskirts of Estaires and Neuve Chapelle, with only a few scattered battalions against them.
