**SAVINGS BANK DEPOSITS.**—Withdrawals still continue to be greater than deposits in regard to the Dominion Savings Bank's business in this Province. In March, according to the statement published by the Finance Department, the amount deposited at the Savings Bank in Charlottetown was \$23,298.00, bringing the total to the credit of depositors at 31st March to \$1,390,114.52. But the withdrawals within the same period amounted to \$36,832.82, and thus the balance at the credit of depositors at the 31st March has descended to \$1,853,218.70. Comparison with the statements issued in regard to the Savings Bank in other provinces, Manitoba, British Columbia, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, brings to light the interesting fact that in all the Maritime Provinces, the amount withdrawn during March was greater than the sum deposited, while, on the other hand, both in Manitoba and British Columbia, the amount of deposits for the month exceeded, by considerable margin, the amount of the withdrawals.

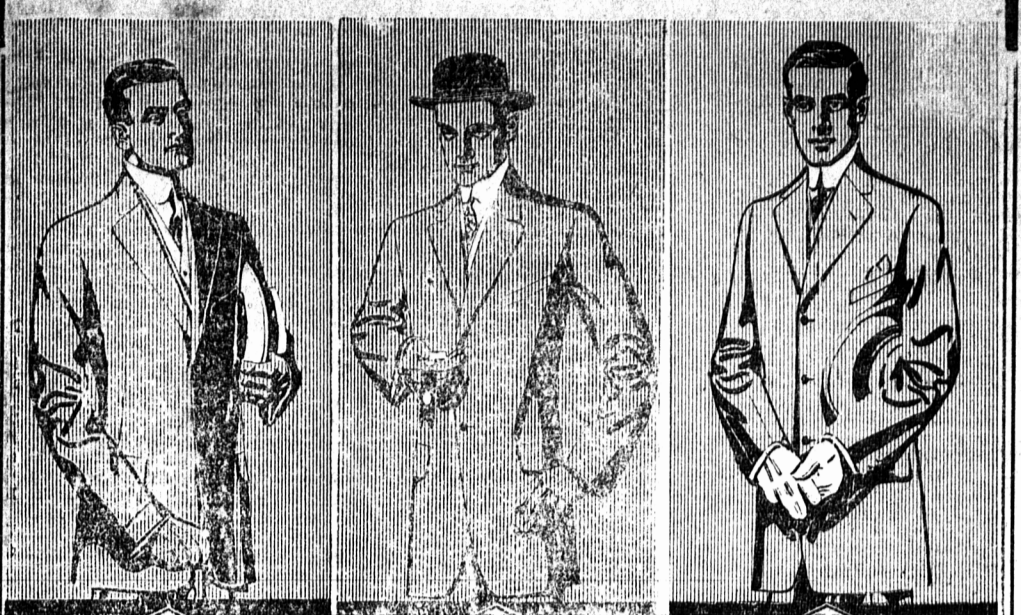
