Build \$5,400 Road To Aid Legless Vet

CAPTOWN, Nov. 27 —(CP)—A legless soldier is to have a road in suburban Wetton specially surfaced for him so that he can walk home safely. He is Sgt. Billy Conradie, a six-foot-four-inch infantry platoon sergeant who trod on a German mine when leading his men into action in the closing stages of the Italian campaign. His injuries were so severe that both legs had to be amputated at the knees.

Sgt. Conradie is in a military hospital in Johannesburg where artificial legs are being made for him. He will be able to walk with practice, but only on a hard surface. His parents, with whom he will stay when he returns to Capetown, live in Roath Road in Wetton, which is an uneven sandy track about 100 yards long. It would be quite impossible for the wounded soldier to go to and from his home unless he was carried or wheeled in a bath chair.

Because of his predicament, his mother approached G. H. Pierce, provincial secretary, who appealed to Mayor A. Bloomberg.

"It may seem a lot to ask that a road should be specially made up for one man, but it is little compared with the great sacrifice which Sgt. Conradie has made on our behalf," he wrote.

The mayor sent the appeal to the streets committee with a strong recommendation that the road be built. The cost will be \$5,400 but the committee has agreed to it.

When Sgt. Conradie comes home for Christmas work will have started.

Feathers Are The Fashion In Paris

PARIS, Nov. 28 — (Reuters) — Feathers are the fashion in Paris this winter and everyone is wearing ostrich plumes, egrettes and birds' heads.

Quills are the first favorite for daytime and particularly for sport. Rising from the crown of small falets worn at the back of the head or worn across the brim of bowlers they are featured by all the leading Paris milliners.

Ostrich feathers and egrettes have taken Paris milliners by storm. For restaurant or theatre wear a cascade of pink ostriches is shown on a small evening toque made by Rose Valois. Akrettes rising from the front of the brow like a maharaja's turban are also popular for dressy occasions.

Velvet and satin for headwear also are the fashion in Paris at night. Small tight-fitting bonnets trimmed with whole birds or with sprays of cock feathers rival draped crowns.

MISSIONS IN MALAYA GIVE AID TO AILING

NEW DELHI, Nov. 27 —(CP)— Two Indian medical missions, working in different areas to avoid overlapping, have aided more than 189,000 people of different nationalities in Malaya. The missions worked in the interior of the Peninsula and in districts where there was a large number of Indians.

The number of persons examined by the Government of India Medical Mission to the end of July, 1946, was 84,329. Of these, 28,826 were treated for various ailments. The Congress Medical Mission, during its nine-week's stay in the Northern States, attended 122,860 patients, of whom 82,475 were Indians.

Motor Traffic At Border Sets Record

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 —(CP)—More automobiles—529,700—crossed the international border into Canada during October than in any other previous October, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Of that total, 452,910 vehicles were of foreign registry and 176,805 were Canadian cars returning to the Dominion. The foreign entries included 325,014 short-term visitors, 111,696 tourists and 16,200 United States commercial vehicles. The Canadian return traffic included 146,566 cars which had been in the United States 24 hours or less, 17,512 vehicles returning from stays of more than a day and 12,718 Canadian commercial vehicles.

The tourist car total of 111,696 was a 31 per cent increase over the October, 1945, total of 84,933—and every province had a share in the increase.

Biggest increase—46 per cent—was in the Maritimes, where tourist traffic jumped from 2,427 to 7,662. Other provinces, with the 1944 total in brackets: Quebec 25,669 (16,252); Ontario, 61,552 (50,019); Manitoba, 1,648 (1,113); Saskatchewan, 551 (475); Alberta, 564 (326); British Columbia, 19,892 (11,470).

'ELIZABETH' AIDS TIRED HOUSEWIVES

LONDON, Nov. 26—Brain-child of three demobbed officers of the British women's services, "Send for Elizabeth" is proving a boon to tired housewives, businesswomen and bachelors distraught with household worries.

To earn a living Annette and Mary Birtwhistle and Mrs. Mona Corbould, founded Auxiliary Household Services, and called it "Elizabeth" for short. For 3s 6d. (85 cents) an hour they do housework for anybody—but they won't queue for caviare, comb poodles or arrange flowers.

"It's time housewives had a break," said Mrs. Corbould. "They have queued and cooked, washed and sewn single-handed long enough. We three are ready to give them the break they need and deserve."

And that goes, too, for business women and bachelors with toeless socks and frayed cuffs.
