IN MEMORIAM
MRS. PETER McNUTT
Another of the links connecting the past and the present has been severed in the death of Mrs. McNutt, widow of Hon. Peter McNutt of this city, which took place after a brief illness at an early hour Monday morning, the 27th instant. Mrs. McNutt was a daughter of the late Mr. Thomas McNutt and his wife Annabella Stewart and was the last survivor of a family of twelve sons and daughters. Although living in

comparative retirement during the past few years she will be greatly missed by the many warm friends who loved her for her kindly, hospitable friendliness and her consistent Christian life. She leaves to mourn one daughter, Miss Mary E. and granddaughter Miss Bella Bagnall who lived with her from childhood and two sons, Preston of Malpeque and Ernest of Charlottetown.
