The National Clothing Collection

JUNE 17th-JUNE 29th, 1946

The Objective - At the request of the Canadian Government, the Canadian Allied Relief organization is sponsoring a second National Clothing Collection Campaign on behalf of people in need of clothing.

What Is Needed - All kinds of used, serviceable clothing are required. These include: suits, overcoats, uniforms, work clothes for men and boys, dresses, aprons, and work clothes for girls and women, shoes in pairs (tied with string), caps, felt hats, knitted head-wear, gloves, woolen socks, underwear, clothing, piece goods, blankets, sheets and linens, draperies and curtains.

Collection of Clothing - This will be done according to the arrangements set up by local committees.

GOOD EATING - Though now is the time to think of the varieties of vegetables you will plant in this year's vegetable garden, the most immediate problem at hand is what to have for dinner tonight. Livestock - MONTREAL, April 20 — (CP) — Prices were stronger for hogs and veals and firm for cattle today. Good butchers were 18-18.25 dressed. There was a heavy light run of cattle offered and trading was brisk. Good butchers were 12.50-13. Medium kinds were 12.50-13.25 and common down to 9. Heflers ranged from 7-12. Good butcher cows were 9.50-10 with a few choice animals making 10.50-11.50. Light lambs were 6-8.25. Good butcher bulls sold up to 11 with common kinds going at 7.50-9.25.

Veal calves were in good demand from 11-14.50 with the bulk of the in-between grades selling from 12.50-14. Drinkers were 6-11. Hogs were weighed in at 20-20.25 for grade A. Some early sales to 20-20.50. A few spring lambs were sold at 8-10 according to weight and quality. Light lambs were not wanted. Sheep were 5-10.

A Last Word - All those wishing to further the interests of the Canadian people, the press, the radio, from the pulpit, at community or association meetings and in other ways, are asked to urge their public to search attics, trunks, closets and similar storage places for clothing they can spare for the relief of the destitute people of the stricken countries. Excess clothing to assist in the campaign are urged to get in touch with their community chairman.

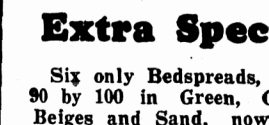

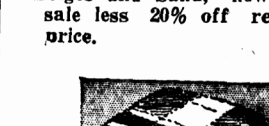
