

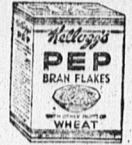


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HEARTS AFIRE

CAR OWNERS' TAX BILL

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Motor vehicles operated in Canada ran their owners into a tax bill of \$66,700,000 last year, according to an estimate released tonight by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Revenues collected by the province from registrations of motor vehicles, operators, etc., for 1932 amounted to \$61,126,271, as against \$19,694,906 for 1931. This was an increase of \$2,441,363, or 7.32 per cent, and was all made in Ontario and Alberta. These two provinces made increases of 30.96 and 22.20 per cent, respectively, by increasing the rates. All the other provinces collected smaller revenues, ranging from 4.41 per cent for New Brunswick to 9.76 per cent for Prince Edward Island.

Swordfishing Industry Is Revived In N.S.

(Special to The Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 13.—Considerable quantities of swordfish from Cape Breton, N. S., are continuing to pass through Moncton enroute via St. John to Boston, according to Canadian National Express officials here.

It has been some years since the swordfishing industry in Cape Breton has witnessed such activity express officials stated. Last week approximately two hundred craft were engaged in fishing out of Ingonish. The fishermen are making good money and reports have been received of one man, a native of Canso, who has a boat manned by himself and two sons, who has made a profit of \$8,000 for the season to date, while other Cape Breton fishermen also claim to have made considerable sums.

False Alarm Fire At Sea

(A.P.)—A false alarm of fire was raised on the sea today and sent rescue craft hastening to the supposedly imperiled vessel. The steamer, making heavy funnel smoke, was sighted by the Oskata Life Saving Station, which reported the vessel to be apparently afloat and requiring assistance. The station sent out its own power surf boat only to find all shipshape aboard the steamer.
