there as elsewhere, he was looked upon by his conferees and the public generally as one of the most honorable and dependable of men. During the dark days of a few years ago, when American Banks were crashing on every hand, he was much in demand as an adviser and adjuster in attempts to save from the wrecks as much as possible and in every case he was loudly commended for the faithful and effective service which he was able to render - all this too, in addition to his regular duties. It is not improbable that this extra work was in some measure responsible for his breakdown in health at a comparatively early age, for he was then still under sixty.
