### BOURASSA MET

**A QUEBEC MOB GORED TO DEATH**

QUEBEC, Aug. 5.—Blood was shed, windows and electric lights were smashed and five arrests were made in the course of a tumultuous meeting on Jacques Cartier square tonight, when Henri Bourassa, M. P. for Labelle, attempted to outline the program which he mapped out since his entry into the arena of provincial politics. The disturbance which started at the outset of the meeting was carried on by some hundred young ruffians stationed near the speaker's platform. Armand Lavergne, M. P. for Montserrat the first speaker, was hooted and jeered but continued to try to finish out his remarks.

Some in the front of the platform, began to shuffle in the direction of the speaker and when they met there was a free fight. Then the police took a hand in the affair and a squad of thirty charged the crowd. Three arrests were made then and more followed later. The riotous proceedings continued and finally Mr. Bourassa was forced to cut his speech short. Eggs, stones and sticks flew right and left, and many in front of the crowd were struck. Mr. Bourassa himself escaped injury. When the rioters returned to the Chateau Frontenac, a prominent lawyer of Montreal and the editor of one of the French dailies, came to blows over the trouble.

### PORTER CHARGED

**WITH ROBBERY**

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—Police Inspector D. A. Noble, of the I. C. R., whose headquarters are at Campbellton (N. B.) and his assistant, Walter Moore, of L'Yves, made what is considered to be an important arrest in Montreal yesterday, when they took into custody Henry B. Williams, colored porter, who has been working for the I. C. R. for the past three or four weeks.

The porter is charged with robbing three passengers of \$37 last Friday night. The theft is alleged to have been committed on the train running between Montreal and Rivier Ouelle. The passengers robbed were in the sleeper "Tabascant and Tantalus", while Williams was porter in the Shediac.

One of the passengers lost \$23, another \$7, and another \$5. The robbery was reported to Inspector Noble, and he and Assistant Inspector Moore, after investigation, placed Williams under arrest in his boarding house in St. Antoine street.

In his possession were found nine pawn tickets from New York and elsewhere for watches, rings, and diamond pins; and the sum of \$40. The pawn tickets were turned over to the local police, who will communicate with the New York authorities. Williams has been in the I. C. R. service only a few weeks.

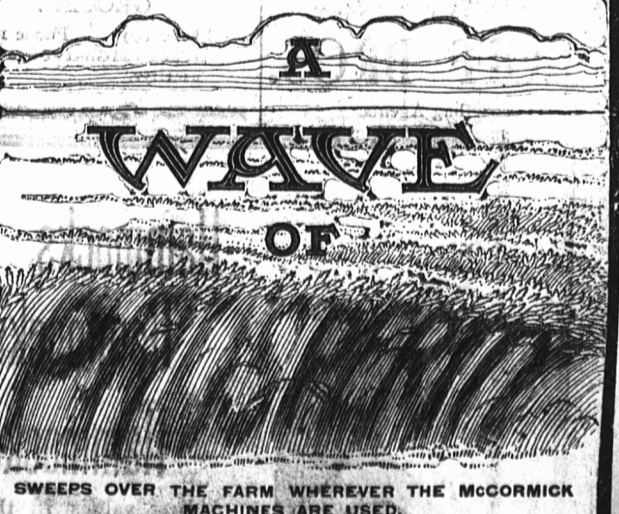
