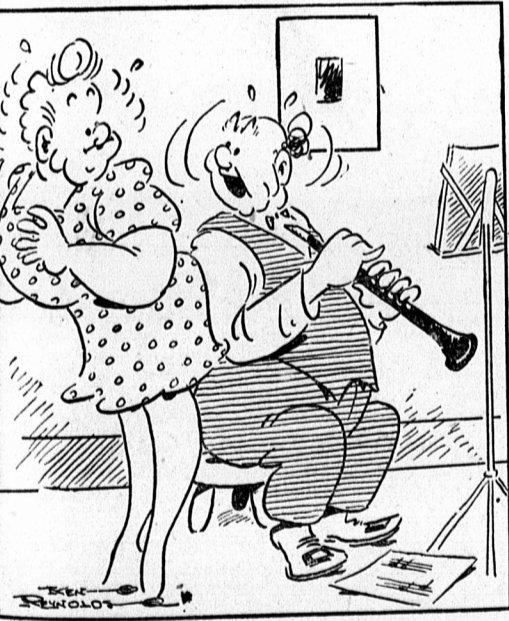

## Contract Bridge

The Unnecessary Cue

Today's declarer lost his sound slam contract because he tried to guess the position of a queen, when actually he could have located that card beyond doubt.

East dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:  
East 1♠ South 3♥ West 5♥ North 5♥  
Pass 3♥ Pass 5♥ Pass  
Pass 6♥ Pass 5♥ Pass

West opened the spade deuce; East put up the ace and returned the spade queen. Declarer won and promptly drew trumps, then, obviously feeling that his only chance for the contract was to guess the location of the club queen, led the club jack through West, to tempt that player to cover if he could. West, however, was not so gullible; he played low without any revealing hesitation, and declarer thereupon put up the club ace from dummy in a belated decision to finesse the other way.

When, however, the club six was led toward the closed hand, East showed out and it was all over—a club trick had to be surrendered, for the defeat of the contract.

South should have deferred his club guess until he had gathered a great deal more information about the opponents' distribution. Observe how informative this line of play would have been:

South, after winning with the spade king, leads a diamond to the ace and ruffs a diamond with an honor. He goes back to dummy with a trump and ruffs another diamond; then repeats this process to ruff dummy's last diamond. If he observes the fall of cards he will see that East actually stowed two hearts and five diamonds (since West "falls" on the fourth diamond) and West's original fourth-best lead (which there is no reason to suspect as false) marks East with five spades. Thus East cannot have more than one club! South has only to lay down the club king, and when East plays the four-spot, South can finesse against West with complete assurance.

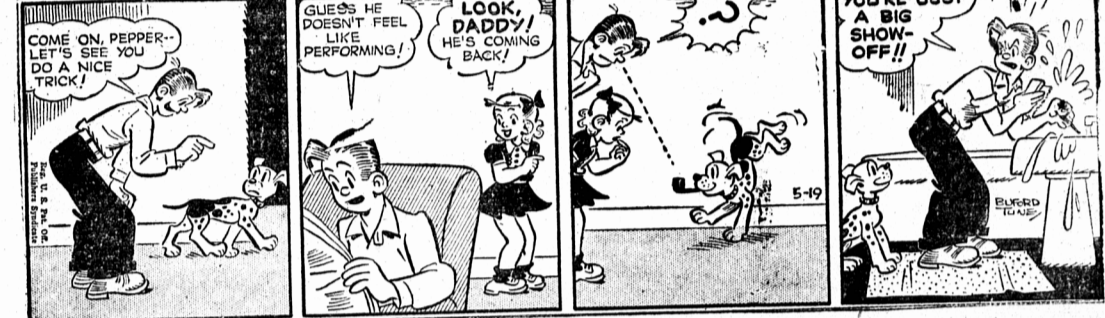

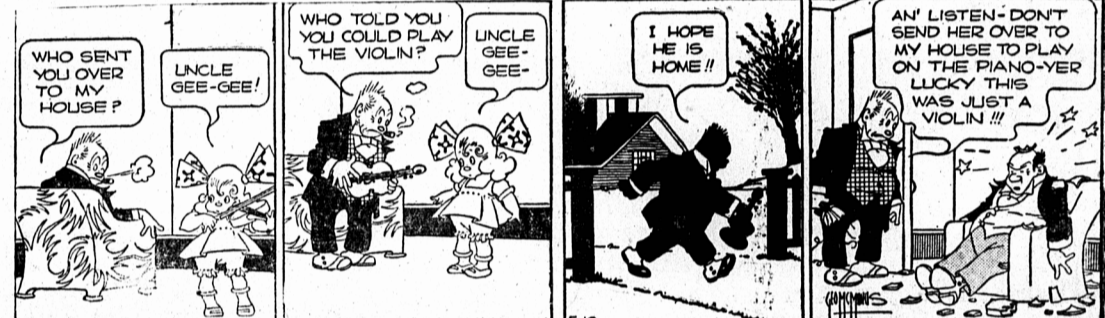

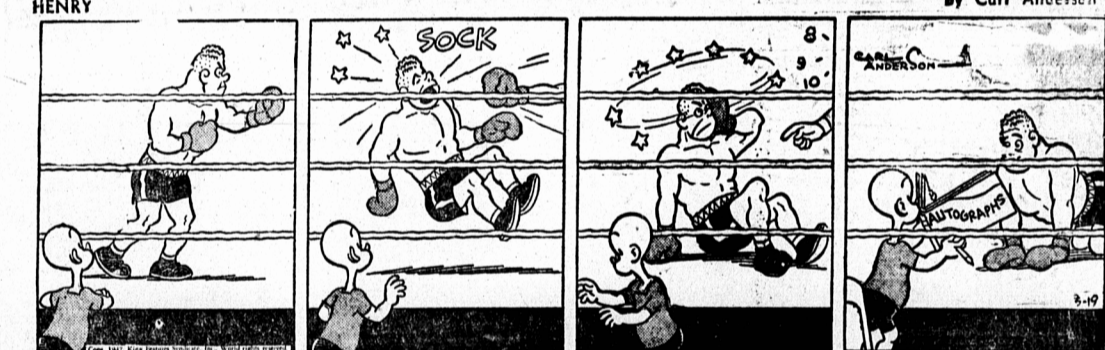
