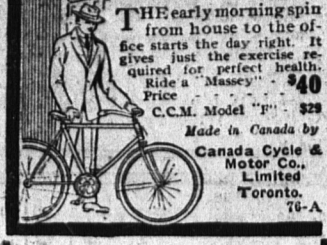

breeding and grading up any class of stock, this community will develop a reputation for that particular grade and much better prices for such will be obtained; for which reason we should make as few changes in breeds of cattle as possible, and while I have stated I have nothing to say against the Shorthorn as a superior beef animal, I think the present craze for what is termed the dairy or dual purpose Shorthorn to use on good dairy grades is a regrettable one, and will land the people trying it where they began.

I have heard it claimed that some of the dairy breeds are what is termed "hard to feed." This is not borne out in fact. Many experiments have been conducted in Government stations with several of the different breeds from calfood up to a finished age for the block, and while the weight and quality of beef varied greatly, the cost per pound was very close in all cases. I have never at least seen one instance where any breed made cheaper gain in weight for a given pound than Holstein youngsters did and there is little in this "hard to feed" objection you don't intend to feed generously keep the old P. E. I. scrub; she will stand starvation better than any known breed but don't jump readily from one pure breed to another if you wish to make any real progress in dairy breeding, and keep in mind that in the official yearly testing of the different dairy breeds this fact has invariably been brought out, that the heaviest milkers of any breed are its most "economical" producers or other things being equal the cow that gives the heaviest flow of milk in a year produces the cheapest milk. Big milkers command big prices.
