**Schooner Henry Ford Picked To Race Champion Bluenose**

(Special to The Guardian)  
**GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 14**—After thirty miles of free going and a ten mile dead beat to windward, the Gloucester schooner, Henry Ford, picked by the American race committee today to sail against the champion Bluenose, in the fishermen's cup race next week. The Ford well earned the decision. Running and beating to windward she showed herself without a weak point, she beat her big rival the Elizabeth Howard of New York, a mile, the Yankee, of Boston, three miles and the Ladunton, five miles. It was a fresh westerly wind and smooth water when the racing vessels began to manoeuvre for position before the start. They were handled with more snap today, ranging widely back and forth behind the line as if they were all out for blood, which the Howard and Ford certainly were. After what happened Thursday, when the Howard with a mile lead carried away a topmast.  
 The start was pretty, Captain Mike Brophy in Yankee, shot across the line one second, and Ben Pine in the Howard, just three seconds after the starting signal. Both vessels breaking all previous records for big racing vessels for a one gun start. 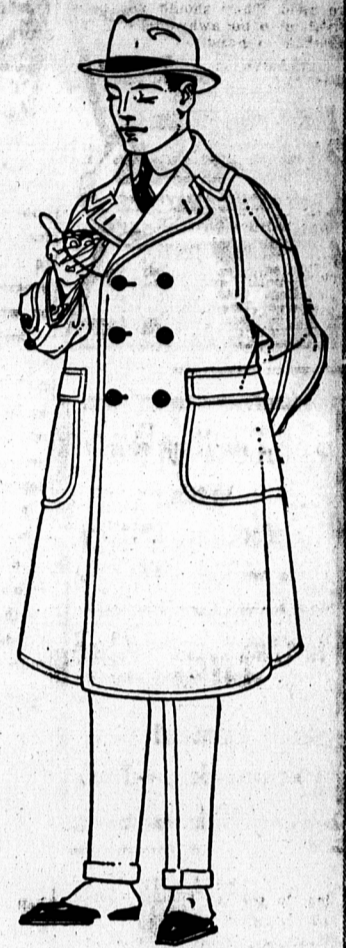

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**SAINT DUNSTAN'S WIN DOUBLE HEAD**

**Senior Team Defeats K. of C. 12-0 and Intermediate Team Wins From League of Cross 6-0.**

At the Abegweit grounds on Saturday afternoon a double-header in football was staged between the Saint Dunstan's Senior team and the K. of C. The second game was between the second Saints and the League of the Cross.
