CHICAGO, April 14—Church members of the Baptist denomination apparently have placed indirect sanction on a double standard of morality for men and women. After a lively session the congregation of the Woodlawn Park Methodist Church voted to refuse admission to membership to Mrs. Mary A. Lavender, whose name was involved two years ago with that of the Rev. John D. Leek, then in charge of the Methodist Church in this city.

It was alleged by the Rev. E. A. Crawford, formerly pastor of the Woodlawn Park Methodist Church, that Mrs. Lavender had made a confession to him. She denied this, and a sensational church trial ensued. Later court proceedings were brought by Mrs. Lavender against the Rev. Mr. Crawford.

In the light of the fact that Dr. Leek has for more than a year been a regularly ordained Baptist minister and now occupies the pulpit of the First Baptist Church, of Batavia, Ill., friends of Mrs. Lavender declare she is being judged by a double standard of morality.

MADE \$550,000 SAYS LIVING IS TOO MUCH.
NEW YORK, April 14—Though Axel Hirschsprung declares he has made a fortune of \$250,000 in 46 years in New York, he said yesterday that he was leaving this country because of the high cost of living and bad business conditions. Axel came here when 29 years old, and has been in the ship chandlery business ever since at No. 37 1-2 Water street. He sailed yesterday on the steamship United States for Copenhagen, his native city. His once extensive trade has dwindled to almost nothing since steamships have replaced the old square riggers and other sailing craft. Still he did pretty well. Besides his fortune he took with him his collection of foreign stamps, coins and valuable Oriental rugs that had been given and sold him by sailors arriving here from the far east. Hirschsprung is now 74 years old, and he intends to live with his brother, Harald, an 80-year-old professor of medicine in Copenhagen University.
