"Y" CAMPAIGN IS MAKING FINE PROGRESS

First Day Collections \$1,338.50 — Y's Men to Hold Summer Camp.

The various captains of the teams now working on the annual subscription for the Y.M.C.A. met in the "Y" last evening and reported a splendid reception of their efforts on the first day of the drive.

The total collections and pledges yesterday amounted to \$1,338.50—just one third of the objective of \$4,000 set by the campaigners as their goal.

The campaigners enjoyed a supper prepared by the Ladies Auxiliary of the "Y" after which a short sing song was held and the receipts of the different divisions and teams totaled.

The collections of Division One in which the team captains are Messrs. L. J. Stacey, W. A. Stewart, Dr. Goodwill, Mr. W. V. Purdie and Dr. Ayres amounted to \$300 while the amount collected by Division Two in which the team captains are Messrs. W. N. Wilson, E. E. Clawson, J. M. MacFadyen, Roy Cudmore and C. J. MacLean was \$381.50.

Amounts gained by the three special teams amounted to \$649.

Short speeches were made by Messrs. A. M. Douglas, Roy Cudmore, Dr. Clark and Chairman N. D. MacLean.

Mr. MacLean announced that the Y's men will be conducting a camp for twenty-five underprivileged children at Canoe Cove this summer.

ed that the Association will not in future endorse any man's note and that payments for fertilizer must be made in cash or by a crop mortgage.

In reply to a question Mr. Trainor stated that the \$46,000 loss from last fall could have been avoided by use of refrigerator cars rather than ordinary box cars.

It was pointed out by a member that the Association should discontinue the farmers would be at the mercy of the individual dealers. He suggested that a motion be made to the effect that the Association continue.

The chairman asked if the members would be willing to organize a joint stock company.

This was followed by considerable discussion which showed that the members which prefer to carry on as at present.

It was pointed out by the chairman that some definite committee should be set up to see that necessary from the members before the organization could carry on.

It was suggested by Mr. Rhynes that last season's shippers should liquidate the debt by advancing 6c per bushel on the potatoes shipped by them.

The chairman replied that every effort would be made in this direction and that the expression of the members as willing to support the association might help their credit but that it must be backed by a cash support on their part.

In reply to a question the chairman stated that \$75 from each member would put the Association on a sound basis.

Mr. Trainor believed an improvement in potato trade would take place if the proposed legislative adjustments were carried out.

Upon Mr. Robertson's motion being placed before the meeting it was passed without a dissenting vote.

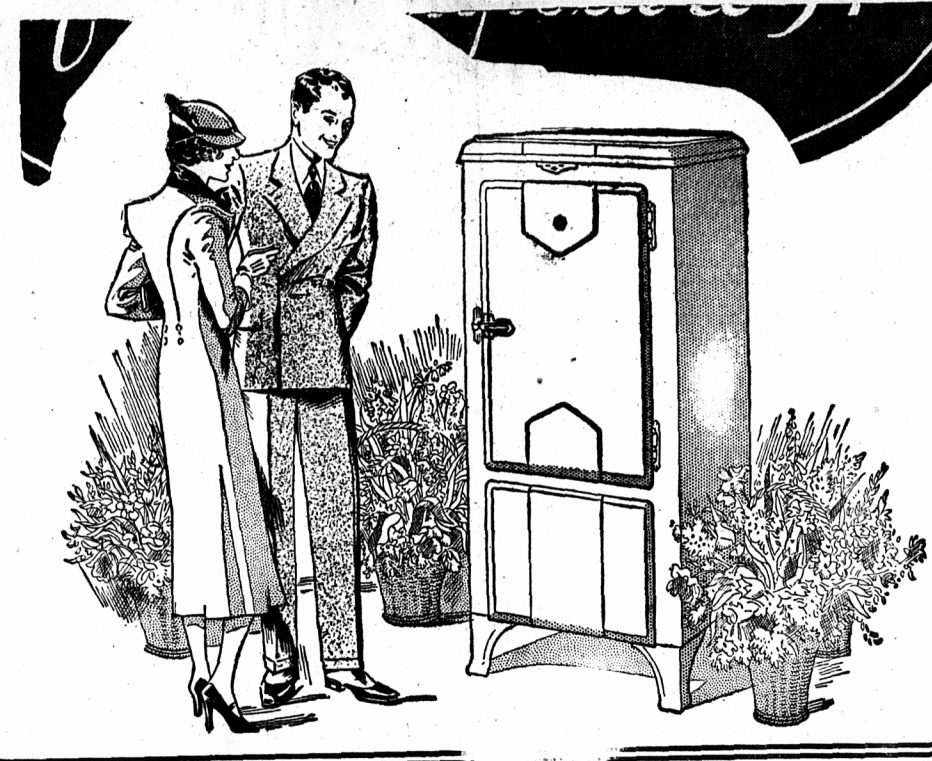

Premier MacMillan and Mr. Justice Arsenault, president of the Tourist Association, have received telegrams from the committee of the Senate investigating the possibilities of the tourist business, asking that an Island representative appear before the Senate committee to place the advantages of this Province before the committee.

As it was impossible to send a representative, a brief has been forwarded, setting out the difficulties encountered, and be in a position to form an opinion as to whether or not there was any hope of success in this means of dealing with the problem.

A motion of Mr. R. E. Mutch, seconded by Mr. Tweedy was passed by the meeting as follows: "Moved that the secretary write to Hon. W. Chester S. McLeure and ask if the operating deficit of the consolidated revenues of Canada or if they are still a part of the railway deficit and ask the cost of operation and revenue."

A letter was read from Mr. V. U. Applin to the effect that the C. N. R. was prepared to run a two day a week passenger service to Souris. Mr. MacNutt, President of the Board stated that he had been informed that there would be no money for the service during the summer months but that he believed it would be inaugurated for the fall and winter months.

Mr. MacNutt stated that he had been requested to see the Superintendent of Education in connection with the report of the fire committee to request that some time be spent in the schools of the province on the teaching of fire prevention. The superintendent, Mr. MacNutt reported, was endeavoring to have a book on this subject placed on the curriculum for grade six or seven.

Mr. W. L. Higgins reporting for a special committee reported that they had interviewed the railway with regard to the rebuilding of the freight office. It was proposed that the office might be placed in the west end of the building on the ground floor as being more convenient to merchants.

Information was received by the Board to the effect that the Mur-ray Harbor train is to be discontinued one day a week and it was suggested that the curtailment of service be made on Wednesday rather than on Thursday. On motion the matter was referred to the time table committee.

MONTREAL, May 9.—Gross revenues of the Canadian National Railways for the week ended May 7, were \$5,200,000 as compared with \$5,142,000 for the corresponding period of 1933, an increase of 675,000.

was being smuggled into Canada. It was obviously an invitation to the smuggler when the duty, as he estimated it, amounted to about \$1400 on an article that cost a maximum of 80 cents to produce. Drastic reduction of the duty would mean a great loss of revenue at the start but if the same amount of liquor were consumed and duty paid on all of it, the revenue would be not less than at present, Senator Hughes believed.

Can't Do It "Down in the Maritime Provinces there is a small army of preventive officers trying to stop this smuggling," Senator Hughes said. "But they cannot do it." He described the difficulties of patrolling a coast line of the configuration of the Maritimes with deep coves and numerous islands. The liquor was smuggled in with the approval if not the connivance of the majority of the inhabitants, he said.

The committee proposed by Senator Hughes would examine members of the preventive force and discover first hand the difficulties encountered, and be in a position to form an opinion as to whether or not there was any hope of success in this means of dealing with the problem.

Trend Upward

"The trend of the pulp and paper industry is upward. Those engaged in the fishing industries are anticipating more favorable marketing conditions than for some years past. Reports from the general manufacturing industries indicate that improvement experienced during the latter half of 1933 will be carried along during the present year. If something can be done for the building and construction industries, and let us hope the Federal Government will carry out its proposed national construction program, which in turn will assist other industries, we are well along the road to general recovery."
