LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

THERE will be some very choice home-made candy at the afternoon tea in St. Paul's schoolroom this afternoon, and the price will be moderate.

IN referring to traffic on the Intercolonial the Truro News says:—About 30 trains arrived and departed from Truro between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday night. Close to 450 cars were moved—great press of traffic was the cause of this extra work upon the department.

THE St. John Globe says:—Apparently there are not many young men in this vicinity who are anxious to serve their country in the ranks of the Northwest Mounted Police. Up to three o'clock today Colonel Morris who recently visited Charlottetown, had only enlisted three recruits, and they came from places outside the city.

THE roses worn by the members of the Sons of England on Monday night were imported by Mr. James Tait, florist, Richmond Street west, and were received in excellent condition, and were admired by all who saw them. Mr. Tait imported nearly 200, and crowds were at his nursery all day long trying to purchase England's emblematic bud. He intends ordering a supply for the 24th of May, Her Majesty's 81st birthday. Any person requiring roses should leave their order with Mr. Tait within the next few days.

THE evil of persons expectorating on the sidewalks and stairways of public offices in this city of Charlottetown certainly demands the attention of the proper authorities. At the fortnightly meeting of the Halifax Board of health the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the authorities of New York and ascertain what rules are in force there "covering expectoration in street cars, etc. If the rules in force there can be made applicable here, the board will in all probability draw up a set of rules on the same lines."

THE Winnipeg Free Press April 20th says:—"In the Transvaal," a five-act military drama, was presented by the Harry Lindley company last night at the Grand to a good house. The play is intensely patriotic, and appealed strongly to the feelings of the audience. The stirring incidents which have marked the history of South Africa, from the time of the Jameson raid to the present, furnish the basis of the story, and some very good military scenes were introduced. Mr. Lewis Talbot made his first appearance with the Lindley company last night, and made a good impression. "Rip Van Winkle" will be the bill to-night. [Harry Lindley is well known to Charlottetown theatre goers.]

A Charlottetown gentleman being in Boston writes, asking if automobiles have reached his native city. In referring to the horseless carriage in Boston he says:—"The modern horseless carriage, automobile, locomobile or other described conveyance hasn't yet become so common in Boston that it has ceased to attract attention and awaken curiosity. A new one appeared on the streets Friday, somewhat different from any before seen here; and the manner in which it whizzed up and down Tremont street created quite a sensation. Again, the other morning, it was seen making a good 10-mile pace on Commonwealth avenue. The horseless carriage has reached Boston to remain."

THE horsemen of Sydney are found to be up to the times and are preparing for a big season's work. They have succeeded in inducing the clever young trainer, Al. Essery, to leave Boston and take up his residence there. Mr. Essery has several Sydney horses on his string and is making ready to receive from the Hub the following New England horses, which he intends campaigning the provinces with the coming season: Leighton, 2.23; Jimmy C., 2.21; Hobson, 2.23; L. W. C., (2) 2.42; and two unmarked colts by Early Bird, 2.10. Mr. Essery is a careful, skilful and enthusiastic driver. He has been exceptionally successful on Mystic, Readville and other American tracks. Truly the lovers of harness horses in Cape Breton must be envious in obtaining such an honest, capable trainer and driver as the clever genial Al. [The Mr. Essery referred to above is a son of Mr. George Essery of this city.]

FARMERS throughout this fair Isle will be pleased to learn of the prospect of money in horse breeding. A journal in the Upper Provinces in referring to horse raising in the Maritime Provinces states that in Prince Edward Island very few first-class horses are to be found. In fact Island horse dealers visit the Upper Provinces to find the desired horseflesh. The Toronto World, under heading of money in horse breeding says: "The demand for cavalry horses in Great Britain will not cease when the South African war comes to an end. Henceforth the Mother Country will maintain a large number of mounted soldiers, and there is no reason why the colonies should not get the first chance of supplying the necessary horses. For years to come there will be a ready sale for all suitable horses that this country can produce. Horses that a year or two ago could not be sold for ten dollars, now bring five times that sum. The supply in Canada and the United States has almost been exhausted. We think the farmers of Canada can make no mistake in paying considerable attention to the breeding of horses, particularly of the class that is suitable for military purposes. The Federal and Provincial Government ought to assist the farmers in this specially by the dissemination of information as to the type of animal required."

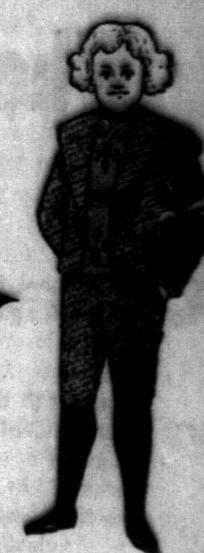
