## THE MARITIME CHAMPIONS MADE A SORRY SHOWING

### In Their Game With B. A. A. Played in The "Hub" Recently—Visit of Sussex Makes Abegweits More Popular in Boston—Some Interesting Sidelights on "The Game"

The following comment by Boston sport writers on the Sussex-B. A. A. hockey game played recently will be of interest to island fans.

**UNICORN FINDS MARITIME CHAMPS SOFT PICKING.**

Boston A. A. won the championship of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia by thumping the sieve like Sussex, N. B. hockey team, 10 to 6, last night. It was a record night, all around.

B. A. A. piled up a record score and the regulars had not been given a vacation. Heaven knows how much the Unicorn would have beaten the down east champions. Abegweits made a record by playing goal for two teams, in but a single night.

Many Other Records: One for Sussex Goalie

There were other records. The Sussex defence made a clean one by failing to stop a single rally by the Unicorn. They left it up to George Napoleon LeClair in goal, and tabulation of the stops he made would not be possible without an adding machine.

B. A. A. started out as if to break all known records for scoring. Four goals were poked in the first 7 minutes and when the first period was over the home team led, 55 to 1, another record of its kind.

In the second period the Unicorn poked in four more goals in 10 minutes. Then the regulars were replaced and Sussex got a goal through the solitary efforts of Jacques LeClair, the only real hockey player in the line up. That made it 9 to 2. Then followed the third period in which the B. A. A. subs netted one more goal and the visitors four. Throughout the Unicorn yannigans took it very easily, and Jim Healy, as if out of sympathy for the visitors, they having travelled so far and gone so little, pushed on into his own net in trying to clear.

Old time fans at the Arena cannot remember any Canadian team which has packed so little power as Sussex a champion in its own halliwick. Its defence was frightful. Why the B. A. A. did not score 20 goals is a mystery. One explanation is that the numbers on the score board did not run over 10.

## WORLD'S SERIES HOCKEY MONEY

### Official Figures of Total Gate Receipts Amount to \$23,119.

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, March 27.—Official figures of the total gate receipts for four games of the world's hockey series between Canadians Vancouver and Calgary, were given out today at \$23,119. Of this thirty percent, or \$6,935 was paid to the Mount Royal arena in this city for rental, \$5,000 for travelling expenses two western clubs, \$8,059 to winning players, \$4,026 to losing players; \$1,118 was divided among three leagues. Each of ten Canadian players received \$804; eleven Calgary players \$183, ten Vancouver players \$201. The clubs received nothing.

## SUSSEX WAS EASY

Sussex may be the hockey champions of the Maritime Provinces, but as a contender for anything other than the Down East championship, the team showed against the Boston A. A. last night that it is not a serious contender, as the wearers of the Unicorn defeated Sussex by the largest score of the season, 10 to 6, at the Arena in a game that was expected to be the feature of the doubleheader.

Instead, the contest between the New Haven bears and the Maple A. A. which ended in a 4 to 3 win for New Haven was the more interesting and provided the greater thrills.

Boston A. A. ran up a score of 5 to 1 in the first period against the Down Easters, and in the second period the margin was 9 to 2, after which the substitute forward line was used by the candidates for the United States championship.
